The bigger picture



Lions Clubs International FOUNDATION

A very happy New Year to all of you reading this. I hope your Christmas collections were successful and everyone stayed safe.

So, a disaster strikes, the Lions help with the immediate aftermath and then they go away. Wrong. Lions stay around to see the job through. In the December *Sentinel* I mentioned that Lions are still supporting those in Ukraine and now I am going back further to April 2015.

On 25 April 2015 Nepal suffered a devastating earthquake, which became known as the Gorkha Earthquake. It took 9,000 lives, injured almost 23,000 and destroyed roughly 500,000 homes. In May a massive aftershock of 7.3 killed a further 200, injured 2,500 and left more Nepalese homeless. LCIF issued a Major Catastrophe Grant of US \$100,000 to MD 325 Nepal for immediate disaster relief. This was not the end of the story. The Lions realised that schools were among the

buildings that had been lost and that for the future of Nepal the education of the children needed to be helped. Roughly 32,000 classrooms had been lost. Lions decided to help re-build schools and applied for funding from LCIF. Two grants totalling over US \$4.6 million were awarded to rebuild 18 schools. The going has not been easy as some of the areas were hard to reach and deliver supplies. However, the Lions persevered and the collaboration of Lions and LCIF have invested in a hopeful future for students in Nepal.

So, your donations may have helped give the students hope in their future.

BE CREATIVE. A NEW YEAR RESOLUTION?

It is probably true of many of us, if not most, that our New Year resolutions have probably faded into dim memory by the end of January, if not sooner.

In these articles, we have looked at many examples of the value of branding, not least, last month of Father Christmas himself.

Ask most marketing people and they will almost always claim that the success of any brand relies on advertising. However, this is something of a simplification because every experience anyone has in relation to a brand will influence how they feel or think about it.

Branding experts call these experiences 'touchpoints'. Our Lions brand probably has more touchpoints than we think. All of these touchpoints will influence how those in our communities who we set out to serve will perceive us.

Someone I spoke to recently said they didn't have time to be a Lion. I pointed out that being a Lion meant more than devoting a couple of hours a week to it. Being a Lion is very much a state of mind and one we cannot nor want to switch off.

A basic list with the name of the event and a brief description, please. In addition, there are some events which unfortunately are not covered by our standard insurance, such as Santa's sleigh and firework displays. It is possible to get additional insurance through our brokers but it is obviously good practice to seek equivalent cover at a better price, and I know a number of you have done so. In order that we do not constantly reinvent the wheel, please let me know of any such policies you have taken out – the type of insurance, who through, when, and the rough cost.

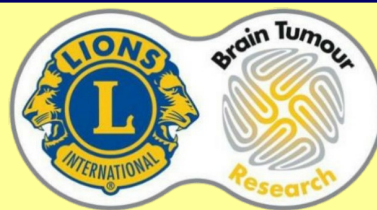

Lions/Brain Tumour Research Appeal Update

Up to the end of 2023 Multiple District has raised **£273,116.98** towards our **£1m** target.

Our District has raised **£42,258.33** of that amount, just over a thousand pounds less than District CW which has raised the most.

If every Club throughout Multiple District had donated £400 for four years, then our million-pound target would have been reached but sadly not every Club throughout the British Isles has participated.

In our District 43 Clubs have contributed to the appeal – a great achievement. I would like to give a big shout out to the following Clubs in recognition of their donations of £1,600 or above: Alton £1,600, Hook & Odiham £1,600, Devizes £1,700, Romsey & Waterside £1,700, Chippenham £2,000, Hart £2,042, Warminster £2,390 and Jersey £2,600.

And finally, my own club, Petersfield has raised a staggering £6,478.71 (including some from Barrie Hayne's mermaid walk).

The appeal is still ongoing so if you would like to host an event or donate, please do. I was fortunate to attend a fundraiser by Swanwick Lions in December with the proceeds going towards the appeal. If your Club donates £2,740 or more then you will be entitled to a plaque on the wall of hope.

Every little helps us reach our target.

With much appreciation to all Clubs who have embraced the challenge. Together we can and do make a difference.

WORKING TOGETHER TO SERVE OUR COMMUNITIES A PERSONAL VIEW

My strapline, when I was District Governor back in 2009-2010, was 'Working together to serve our communities'. I envisaged Lions Clubs getting together to perform service and working with other service groups.

My Club, Hook and Odiham, had already started to do this by working with Hart Rotary at the annual Hartley Wintney Festival. Subsequently we have asked Odiham and Hart Rotary to help us with the annual Hook Village Show.

Christmas sleigh rounds in our villages of Hook, Odiham and Hartley Wintney have always been difficult as Rotary and Lions want to cover as much as the area as possible.

So a couple of years ago we worked with Odiham and Hook Rotary to ensure that we did not duplicate routes.

This year, when we met in August to discuss routes it was suggested we went further and worked together on the routes in Hook and Odiham. Our members agreed and this would mean that we each organized three routes supplying the sleigh, Santa and Rudolph and the collectors came from both Clubs. Decision made, we then had to find more collectors to cover all the evenings, but luckily for Lions, we had some new very keen members, who were willing to help as well as some old stagers like myself. We got our collectors and I did not have to go on every round as usual!

On the first joint evening the Rotary President picked me up and we set off. Much to my surprise the Rotary Santa proceeded to walk the route. With the Lions sleigh Santa is strapped into his seat and talks to the children from the float. This Santa went to the doorway and talked to the children, often high-fiving them. However, this did take some time, especially where there were families in close proximity and we did not always know where Santa was. When the Lions go out they each have a walkie talkie so that they can communicate with each other but we didn't have that luxury!

However we managed to finish the round in good time and I was able to get home before too long.

The other evenings also went well and we collected a good sum of money which is being shared pro rata between the two Clubs.

Would I do it again? Yes, and so would the other Lions who helped. Perhaps next year we can do more rounds covering more of Hook and Odiham.

I will be going to the Rotary Council to discuss it all but so far Rotary also seem to have appreciated the experiment. It has even been suggested that we build a combined sleigh!

Hook and Odiham Lions are also going to work with another Lions Club by holding a joint Charter Anniversay with Loddon Valley on Friday 15 March at The Wellington Arms in Stratfield Turgis. The venue is on the border of our patches and as the Presidents are married, i.e. myself and John, it seemed a good idea to join forces and hopefully get a bigger attendance.

Guernsey Lions’ Peace Poster Competition Winners

Creating peace posters gives children everywhere the chance to express their visions of peace and inspire the world through art and creativity.

The Guernsey Lions Club first took part in 2019 and in 2021 an artist from Les Beaucamps High School won the District final and went through to the national UK finals.

The Peace Poster competition is for 11, 12 and 13-year-olds who design a picture symbolising Peace and based on this year’s theme of “Dare to Dream”

They are not allowed to use lettering or numbers in the content of the picture.

During the last 20 years more than four million children from 100 countries have participated in this global contest.

The local competition closed in October with more than 30 posters received from Guernsey’s St Sampson’s and Les Beaucamps High Schools. Initial judging of the posters took place at the schools and the teachers submitted a final five posters to the Guernsey Lions.

Judging then took place with local artist, Tiffany Matthews, as the lead judge joined by Lions President, Lion Rob Holder, and Lions Youth Chairman Lion Paul Allaway.

After much deliberation, one poster was selected from each school to go through to the District final in England.

The winner from Les Beaucamps High School was 11 year old Chloe Wooldridge who received a £50 Amazon voucher presented during an Art class by



Lion Paul Allaway. A donation of £100 was also made to the Art class in recognition of their support.

The winner from St Sampsons High School was 13-year-old Satang Yusong who also received a £50 Amazon voucher with a £100 donation to the Art Class during a presentation at the school assembly.

Both pictures were submitted to the District finals competing against other Lions Clubs in the District.

Satang’s picture was chosen as the District winner and went through to the UK final where it was judged against other posters from Clubs around the UK and eventually placed a credible third in the national competition.

Fleet Lions continued to promote their 50 years in the town by entering a participant in a local church’s Christmas Tree festival.

The church was raising funds for a group that helps homeless youngsters and also the Foodbank by charging admission and selling lots of things. There were more than 30 trees from various bodies, mainly younger people in Scouting, Guiding and youth groups. And what innovations and plays on words they came up with!

Fleet’s Lion Jim went for the boring angle of “Happy 50th Birthday” and made decorations out of pictures and logos of the Lions’ activities past and present plus a few props. LP Laura found him some lion-shaped tree lights and did her fairy on the top of the tree act with a picture of her-self in her “Simba” lion suit.

The event attracted record audiences over the week-end it was held, so hopefully it raised lots of funds for two very worthy charities.

And, of course, the Fleet Lions participating was a nice bit of PR for the Club and gave the Lions another festive and seasonal way of celebrating their 50 years of serving their local community.

The tree will also provide a number of ready-made materials for future displays in the happy New Year.

'Cherry on Top' ROAR with success in Farnborough

The pupils at Cherrywood Primary School in Farnborough are roaring with pride after their team won the national ROAR 2023 Competition run by education tech company 8 Billion Ideas and the Lions Clubs of the British Isles. Farnborough Lions Club sponsored their entry into the competition which encourages primary and junior school pupils to innovate and 'think big', creating 'world changing ideas' that will be of lasting benefit to us all.

The competition process teaches the children to work together as a team to create a concept, make a prototype, an advertising poster plus a radio jingle before giving a presentation to a panel of judges 'Dragons Den' style. A video of their presentation is then submitted to 8 Billion Ideas to be judged alongside all the schools taking part throughout the United Kingdom.

Team 'Cherry on Top' won through their school heats to take part in the national final broadcast to over 20,000 primary and junior school pupils in hundreds of schools nationwide via Zoom in early December. Their concept created an app for mobile phones so customised ice cream deliveries can be made straight to customers' home addresses.

The judges at the national final liked this idea so much they voted it to be the best entry in District 105SC. Seven other District winners were announced in the same Zoom broadcast.

Cherrywood School has taken part in the last three Lions ROAR Competitions and Farnborough Lions Club is proud to have sponsored their competition entry alongside four other Farnborough schools who entered this year.

The benefits gained by all the pupils taking part in this competition are immeasurable. The ROAR Competition is a unique initiative and fun learning programme to increase children's confidence and self worth giving them future proofing skills and imaginative ideas in line with the national curriculum.

Most people like to have time off between Christmas and New Year, but I have a better idea. I'd like to have the time off between New Year and Christmas.

RECYCLING AFTER CHRISTMAS

Christmas produces a mountain of waste material but does it all have to go into land fill? There are many things which can be saved and recycled, including **Christmas Trees**. *Artificial ones cannot be recycled but can be kept for many years.* **Rooted Christmas trees** can be planted in the garden and taken indoors in future years. Those without roots can be shredded at home, if you have a shredder, or in many areas they can be taken to a local site for shredding. Check with your local Council.

Christmas Cards. Those made entirely of paper can be thrown into a green bin for recycling. Those with glitter or shiny paper should have these parts taken off before recycling. However you can recycle at home. Many people cut them into gift tags for next year or like me, you can use the pictures to make new cards.

Stamps. Many people save stamps for charity. The following link gives details of 19 charities that welcome stamps.- <https://www.countryliving.com/uk/news/a34891519/used-stamps-donate-charity/> I also use the Christmas stamps to make cards!

Wrapping Paper. Unfortunately most of this cannot be recycled. You can save the best and reuse next year!

Christmas Crackers. Generally these are not recyclable because of the materials used to make them but, once again, I recycle bits to make cards.

Fairy Lights. These should be taken to a small electrical collection bank for recycling.

Christmas Decorations. Unwanted ones in good condition can be taken to a local Charity Shop. *Tinsel cannot be recycled so needs to go in your normal dustbin.*

Unwanted Gifts. Either send to someone else, give to a Charity Shop or donate to the next raffle.
