AN IMPORTANT MESSAGE REGARDING SENDING SPECTACLES TO CHICHESTER LIONS

During the past year we have received complaints from Parcel Force about the way boxes are packed as many are splitting open in the vans or at the depot. Also, many boxes are not packed to capacity which means they collapse on stacking. Please ensure that boxes are made of sturdy cardboard and are filled with using other materials such as newspaper or polythene.

Boxes should be a good size (shoe boxes are too small!) and must not weigh more than 10 kg. Please do not call Parcel Force for single boxes - wait until you have several boxes. This helps them cut costs since they provide this service free of charge.

Spectacles should be packed loose and not individually wrapped nor put into plastic bags. Please do not send cases, cleaning cloths, loose or contact lenses.

For Clubs that bring spectacles to us, of course you can continue to drop them off in boxes or sacks, but please remove the items listed above.

Please do not send or bring any spectacles in December or the first two weeks of January.

SOME of you reading this will remember the Campaigns SightFirst I & II. Some of you may also have heard of the Carter Centre which was set up by former US President Lion Jimmy Carter. How many of you know that since 1984 SightFirst and the Carter Centre have worked together to eradicate river blindness? Since 1984 LCIF has approved more than 60 river blindness and trachoma grants totalling over US\$67 million. In fact, during that time the partnership has resulted in more than 236 million treatments and over 117 million treatments to halt trachoma. This is just a small example of the fantastic work done by your LCIF. The two campaigns were hugely successful and now we want to build on that with Campaign 100. However, where the two SightFirst campaigns focused on sight, we want to have an impact in many other areas.

Please take time to read the information inside your Lion magazine which touches on some of the areas Lions want to have an impact in. It talks about ways individuals can give to the campaign. However, there is also a model club programme which is another way a club can contribute. The week of 13 to 17 January is LCIF week. Maybe your Club would consider putting on an event for the campaign. As usual there is plenty of information on the website, or I can be contacted directly.

Another Lions' successful prostate screening event

FLEET LIONS recently organised their fifth prostate screening event at Fleet Hospital. The testing was free of charge to men over 45 and was fully subscribed with 250 attending. The event was funded through the restricted funding the Club has built up for screening in memory of former member Lion Philip Daubeney. The cost of holding an evening like this is circa £5,000, largely due to the cost of the laboratory analysis carried out at Frimley Park Hospital.



Lion Brian Proctor led the organising team. "It's quite a logistical feat to keep an event of this type running smoothly, from booking the appointments, providing the minibus to the hospital, to getting the samples off to be tested," he said. "Everything ran like clockwork, so thanks to everyone who helped. It was particularly pleasing seeing the SERV Wessex Blood Bikers in action as we had supported them in the past."

The results of the tests were sent directly to retired consultant urologist David Baxter-Smith who advised those tested whether they were clear or needed to follow up with their GP. Ten men were so advised after this year's event and it's a sad fact that 200 men across the country are diagnosed with prostate cancer every working day. If detected early enough, the condition can be cured. The Lions want to help with that and to date 136,000 men have been screened at Lions' events.

TREE OF LIGHT

THIS YEAR Hook and Odiham Lions started a new venture inspired by Lion Judith John whose late husband had started a similar scheme 23 years ago in Tavistock in 105SW and then three more in that District.

Local people are asked to sponsor a light on a Christmas Tree for a donation so that a loved one can be remembered at a short service of dedication. This is not primarily a fund raising event and moneys raised should be given to a specific local charity in the area concerned, such as an Alzheimer's club or a club for the visually impaired.

On Thursday 28 November, Hook and Odiham Lions gathered in the High Street in Odiham for this ceremony. By 6:30 pm quite a good crowd had gathered and the ceremony began. People were welcomed and Lion Judith explained the concept and then the chairman of the Parish Council lit the tree.



This was followed by a short service of dedication led by the local vicar which included reading out the list of those to be remembered and concluded by singing carols. Afterwards cards were given to those who had asked for loved ones to be remembered.

Hopefully this will become an annual event and even be introduced to another village.

Living with Type 1 diabetes a poem for World Diabetes Day 14 November

...because you don't look ill, you look pretty normal and still you can run marathons,

make a quest to climb Everest

go north south east west or round the world on your bike

and swim and row and dive and hike.

But you can't join the Army: you have a different battle to fight

and it's quite a mismatch, you won't win outright, can't win this war,

no matter how strong, how brave you've been before.

Diabetes is camouflaged you can't tell you're unwell by looking,

that you're bearing a high-maintenance death-sentence, staring twenty-four-sevenat abstinence and ordinance with a condition whose prominence provokes persistent repentance.

Its invisibility has substance.

Now, back to the question: can this disease be so bad, if jelly babies and diabetes are so platonic? From beginning to end it'll all depend on you because you're the one who has to be in control of your body and soul.

What do YOU consider to be bad? The A B Cs have it: Amputation? BAD Blindness? BAD Cardiovascular disease? BAD And with pathos from me consider retinopathy, neuropathy, nephropathy... no apathy, I've not pulled punches, I'm telling it true, no hunches.

This is why your every waking moment and your nightmares too urge you to test, Inject and all the rest.

Then finally we're in the 21st century catching up with technology.

Not so long ago you'd only know your blood glucose level when you jabbed your finger with a lancet, fed a reagent strip into a gadget. Once, twice a day? More? Four? Eight?

The wait for continuous glucose monitoring was long, then in a flash we had it: like papyrus to text, smoke signal to satellite, this felt right.

It was quick, easy, clean, erudite. We instantly had the means to measure, wherever and whenever, as long as we had the means to pay for it.

A subsidy? That would mean so much to me. Hypo awareness at night was never this kind but what price peace of mind? Actually, it's fifty quid a fortnight for improved quality of life, for the luxury of tracking each step and mouthful of your day, for learning to balance on the sharp edge of a knife, to experiment with food and fitness and, yes, to be 100 per cent safe when driving, to be so much more in control of your own surviving.

And from technology to psychology; the other price to pay is the mental focus needed each and every day. It's monumental to carry the burden of balancing, knowing you must avoid temptations to maximise reduced complications. Though above every other quest I clearly see my presence here is thanks to those pioneering scientists Macleod, Banting, Best and a dog called Marjorie.

Diabetes Jersey, supported by the Jersey Lions, commemorated World Diabetes Day with an hour-long programme on BBC Radio Jersey, a live diabetes test of an ITV Channel reporter on the main evening news and a full page in the local newspaper.
