NOTICE FROM THE CHICHESTER LIONS

The Chichester Lions Club is sad to announce that with immediate effect it is suspending the Spectacles and Hearing Aids Project at the Apuldram Centre.

Most of the Club's volunteers are in the 'vulnerable' group who have been advised by the Government to stay at home and not have any social contact, so it will be too difficult to maintain any sorting.

Please do not send or deliver any spectacles to the Centre for the foreseeable future and until a statement has been released that the project is fully operational again. Website - www.chilions.org.uk. - will be updated.

It is also reported that ParcelForce have terminated the contract that has enabled Clubs to send spectacles to the Centre for many years. This has nothing to do with the coronavirus but over the years this contract has grown exponentially and has been, to a certain extent, misused, e.g. call-outs just to pick up one small box and demands for a 24-hour service. Talks will take place with the company and, if unsuccessful, efforts will be made to find another carrier.

Once the Centre is able to open, Clubs that deliver directly can continue to do so.

Thanks to all the Clubs who have participated over the years and hopefully the Project will continue in due course.

Gift for Living Appeal

Gift for Living is a Lions charitable initiative focusing on the needs of children and their families who have suffered as a result of international conflict in the former Yugoslavia. It was established in 1996, after a convoy of lorries and an intrepid group of Lions and supporters in 1995 took 100,000 shoeboxes filled with necessities and small luxuries to stricken communities in Croatia.

Gift for Living has subsequently provided medical treatment and paediatric training, saving the lives of many unfortunate children.

Hospital units have been provided and fully equipped, focusing on children, maternity, paediatric accident and emergency, and intensive care in East and West Mostar, Goradze, Sarajevo, Bihac and Banja Lunka.

Another priority was to set up training programmes to bring the doctors and nurses up to the latest European standards so the **Gift for Living Appeal** helped fund these projects.

The current appeal project to assist with with the ongoing work of this very worthwhile charity is the collection of unwanted foreign currency left over from holidays or business trips overseas. It is important that we look after our fellow members in the Qubs. To assist that I have asked the Region and Zone Chairmen to contact all the Qubs directly asking Presidents to ensure that all members, especially the most vulnerable, have at least a phone call to make sure they are okay, but if possible to see if they need any supplies or medications delivered.

PCC Lion Peter Burnett has mentioned that most local pharmacies have become inundated with home deliveries of prescriptions as many of the vulnerable clients are unable to leave their home. If you have members in your

Qub that are under the age of 65 and have a bit of time on their hands, they could volunteer. All you need to do is ask a representative of your Qub to contact your local pharmacy.

Devizes Lions Swimathon raises £4,000



Devizes Lions held their annual Sponsored Swimathon on Saturday 29 February at Devizes Leisure Centre.

The Club were delighted that 21 teams took part in Swimathon 2020 on the Saturday afternoon and evening. The volunteer counters totalled up 1,660 lengths of the pool achieved by swimmers of all ages. The total on the sponsorship cards amounted to £4,289 and that goes to the groups and charities who entered. The swimmers from 2nd Devizes Guides accumulated 116 lengths in their 50 minutes session, the best total for any team in the event.

The Club were grateful for the willing assistance provided by the staff at the Leisure Centre.

President Lion Chris Ellis said: "I would like to give my thanks to all who took part in the Swimathon on Saturday. It was great that we were able to run this event again this year."

Jersey Lions' Swimarathon cancelled!



With just a few hours to go and almost 4,000 well-sponsored swimmers ready for the start, on medical advice the Jersey Lions cancelled their 49th Swimarathon. Scheduled to start on Wednesday 11 March and run for five days and with a record number of teams, this was the first time since 1972 that the event has had to be cancelled.

"Obviously this has been a huge disappointment," says Club President Lion Mark Godel, "But we have been vastly encouraged by the number of teams who have already paid in the sponsorship moneys they would have done had they swum and while our final figure is likely to be significantly less than in previous years, we are confident that, with the backing of our sponsors Ravenscroft, we will still be able to achieve in the community much of what we have planned, despite the current circumstances."

Since 1972, the annual Jersey Lions Swimarathon has raised more than £3.5 million.

Lightning strikes - and the Lions strike back!

Highbridge Community Farm's Fruit Shed was struck by lightning in July last year. The strike was thought to have hit the solar panel on the roof, setting fire to the shed's battery. The shed was burned to the ground along with a quarter of the 500 sq m fruit cage, melting three 1,000 litre industrial

bulk container water tanks and the irrigation system for the adjacent growing area.

With financial help from the Eastleigh Lions, the shed has been replaced with one of a similar size. This has been insulated and lined by Farm member Brian Tull in order to store apples and pears during the winter and fitted with shelves to hold 80 trays of fruit.

On Saturday 8 March, the Farm's team leader Dr Andrew Ross hosted a reception for the Eastleigh Lions, thanking them for their support and inviting Club president Lion Peter Coles to say a few words and cut the ribbon formally launching the Fruit Shed back into business.

Recycling dividend

Within the last year Woolmer Forest Lions Club has raised £132 for the Club funds recycling drinks cans, batteries and aluminium. This has been collected by Lions from a number of sources, members of the public and Club members themselves. One particular source that made a significant contribution was the Joneses Dance Studio in Alton.

As a new event, Arts Coaching was rolled out to local children in years 4, 5 and 6 with presentations to local schools by Devizes Lions. The Club was delighted when 244 children signed up.

The workshops were held at Devizes Books, Devizes Museum, the Scout Hut in Southbroom Road, St Andrew's Church Hall and Easterton village hall. The Mayor, Judy Rose, a keen knitter herself, popped in to the knitting workshop at Devizes Books.



The Club was very appreciative of those who made the venues available and the skills provided by all the activity coaches and aim to run the event again next year.

"Harry Purchase Lion of Windsor" is launched

The Windsor Boys' School Boat Club has benefited recently from the generosity of the Lions Club of Windsor with a substantial grant allowing it to purchase a brand new coaching/safety launch. The boat was officially named and launched on the evening of Wednesday 11 March by Lion Diane Purchase.

The boat was named "Harry Purchase Lion of Windsor" in memory of Lion Diane's late husband. Harry was a lifelong rower starting as a 14 year old with Quintin Boat Club in London and later with Leander Club at Henley. He just missed selection for the 1952 Olympic Games held in Helsinki. As a Lion dating from 1974, he was instrumental in many fundraising events to benefit local charities and initiatives. This boat replaces the original "Lion of Windsor" acquired by the school boat club in the 1980s, again with the help of the Lions Club of Windsor.
