

GOOD NEWS ABOUT REPORTING SERVICE

LCI have listened to complaints made by Lions all over the world about the new MyLion reporting system and have now issued a new way of reporting which is very similar to the old system under MyLCI. I have tried it and found it easy to use so please report all the wonderful activities that your Club is doing during such a difficult time. It is important that we report ALL activities and at the moment105SC has a bad reputation for doing so! However despite our lack of reporting in MD105 as a whole we have had great success in providing service with

Two Hundred & Fifty Thousand in April!

And ONE MILLION PEOPLE SERVED since 1 July 2019!

Let's make those figures even bigger by reporting our service in properly.

RECYCLING SCHOOL UNIFORMS - A Different type of Service

For nearly three years Wokingham Lions, led by current president Lion Lyn Baily, have been helping to provide school uniforms for those children, living in the lowest socioeconomic ward in Wokingham, whose parents find the cost of buying new uniforms prohibitive. The idea is to provide re-urposed uniforms for children moving up to secondary school but any child who has a need is provided for, especially those moving into the area very suddenly. The Lions work with a charity called School Days who co-ordinate the whole project. Schools have been visited so that the charity works with them and social media used to advertise the scheme. Pink bins have been placed in supermarkets for people to leave good quality uniform they no longer need. Lion Lyn has organised a team of Lions to empty the bins and sort and clean the clothing. Anything not of good quality is rejected and goes to recycling. The clothes are washed, ironed and any minor repairs made, such as sewing on a button. Labels are added to each item so that they can be named and then sent out in plastic covers looking as good as new Last year there was a glut of winter coats and so the Lions set up pop-up stall and offered a coat to any child needing one, Some 350 to 400 children have been helped in the poorest areas and more than 600 in the whole borough. Wokingham Lions also fund raise or give donations to School Days. Sometimes new uniforms are bought for children when there is no suitable stock. Lions also provide funds for other items that might be needed, such as PE or maths equipment

Why is this important especially now? Many parents struggle to provide the uniform demanded by their local schools. Without this scheme pupils would start at their new school at a severe disadvantage as they would not be the same as their peers. This could lead to bullying, emotional stress and children not reaching their full potential. If parents did buy the uniform it could mean that money for food was used to pay for the kit with consequences for the family. At the moment many families are suffering because of Covid-19 when parents have been laid off and September, when the new school year should begin, is getting closer! Could you set up a similar scheme in your area or work with a similar charity to School Days? One word of caution is that some PTAs operate used uniform schemes to raise money for their schools so you would need to liaise with them. To set up such a scheme storage is needed for the uniforms and it needs to be the correct uniform for the school concerned as some are very specific about what their pupils should wear.

Does your Club have a different type of service? If so please let me know.

I wrote in my last article that the grant information would have changed by the time you read your copy of the Sentinel; I was not wrong. I took part in a symposium last Saturday and the keynote speaker was IPP Lion Gudrun who is now chairman of LCIF. She mentioned the figure of nearly \$4 million. I checked before settling down to write and the figure is \$4,088,981 and 234 grants have been distributed for various projects connected to the current pandemic. Of those grants, 36 have been awarded to constitutional Area IV, otherwise known to you and me as Europe. These are amazing statistics but for every stat there is a story of need and of Lions seeing the need and responding. These grants work because once awarded and received they are administered by Lions on the ground, no government agency, just the Lions.

It was announced during the last week that Campaign 100 which was due to end in June 2021, will be extended due to these unprecedented times. It will now continue through to 30 June 2022.

Once again, thank you to any Clubs who have donated to LCIF - it all counts.

Lion Tiia helps hungry Key Workers

Windsor Lion Tiia Stephens has opened a Community Wellbeing Hub to provide food, drinks and general sustenance to hungry key workers while they are on duty around Windsor. Tiia joined Windsor Lions in 2017 and has given up her full-time employment as a Community Warden with the Royal Borough of Windsor and Maidenhead to concentrate on setting up and running the charity Driven Forward that she founded in 2018. This charity, with financial help from the



Windsor Lions, was established to help adults in Berkshire who are socially excluded, isolated, lonely and vulnerable. This is done by providing transport to and participation in day trips, outings, social activities with the help of adult volunteers.

Obviously during lockdown this type of activity has not been possible so Lion Tiia has switched her ever-fertile brain to helping in other ways. Particularly providing access to the Community Wellbeing Hub which was to be launched in April. It is a 'drop by' facility that provides refreshments and hot food to key workers.

Talking of her new venture, Lion Tiia says: 'I was getting a bit frustrated that with lockdown it was almost impossible to carry on my usual charitable activities with Windsor Lions and the Street Angels Safety Hub. So I came up with the idea of adapting the Community Wellbeing Hub. Key workers have very hard and busy jobs and with most cafés and restaurants being closed, it's difficult to grab a hot drink and something to eat in breaks or while working around the town. What's on offer at the Hub seems to be much appreciated and I am very grateful for all the donations, cooking and baking done by wonderful volunteers that make it all possible.'

With a small group of volunteers Driven Forward opened the Hub at the end of March and now also provides home-cooked meals and essential food packages three and four times a week to 12 homeless people who have been placed together in a local b-and-b during lockdown.

Lion Tiia, pictured above fully protected at a collection point for donations, gives special thanks to loyal volunteer Martin Shea who, she is pleased to report, will officially join the Windsor Lions Club after Covid-19 subsides.

More news from the Clubs - virtual and otherwise

MULTI-AGENCY SUPPORT PUTS FOOD ON THE TABLES

During this Coronavirus crisis, there are many families who for whatever reason, fail to get the support that they desperately need and are unable to ensure that they can put adequate wholesome food on the table for their children.

A highly successful multi-agency approach by the Lions Club of New Milton, the New Forest Basics Bank, local schools and the New Milton Town Council started in April and has ensured that local children need not go hungry during these difficult times.

Each week, Lion Peter Bousfield, chairman of the New Milton Lions Club's Welfare Committee, has liaised with eight local schools to get information on families they are aware are suffering extreme difficulties. In partnership with the New Forest Basics Bank, supplies of food for a week for the families have been put together each Friday and the New Milton Town Council's ground staff have turned their hand to efficiently delivering up to 76 food parcels to local families in and around New Milton. They have delivered more than 200 food parcels in the first three weeks that the project has been running.


All of those involved have been touched by the comments received from parents who received these very welcome deliveries of fresh fruit and vegetables, tinned goods, toiletries and some surprises – all put together by the willing volunteers, headed by Oliver Stanley, the chairman of the Basics Bank.

All of this has only been possible through funding provided by the MD105 Foundation Emergency Grant, supplemented by monies from The Lions Club of New Milton and the generosity of many local Town and District Councillors.

President of The Lions Club of New Milton Lion John Alcock praised the members of his Club, in particular Lion Peter Bousfield, who had so quickly put the project into action once the need had been identified and confirmed with the representatives of all of the local schools.

Poole Lions Club counted themselves extremely lucky to have held their 42nd annual Swimathon in February before the Covid-19 virus reached our shores.



The Editor has the last word ...


