My Fellow Lions

We, at District, will do our best to mitigate those Club losses with more effort being put into both new member recruitment and retention events. We are also seeing a heightened interest in forming branch Clubs and speciality Clubs which we will pursue.
- Can I, at this point, welcome our colleagues from the Swindon Chautari Lions Club. The Nepalese Club was chartered last October and I look forward to meeting you all.
- As we move into a new Lionistic year, I have undertaken some small changes to the District structure in an aim to make it more open, accessible and accountable to you, its members. We have done away with one level of administration between Clubs and Districts by removing the Region chairmen. From now on the Zone chairmen will talk directly to District as an integral part of the District Governors Advisory Team. The Ist Vice District Governor will chair this meeting at regular intervals and Zone chairmen will be able to report (and share) their activities, learn about the changes in advice (and regulation) that comes down from above, on a regular basis, along with inviting guest speakers to their meetings. I hope that this will give Zone Chairmen more enthusiasm to engage with and enjoy the process.
- A big welcome to all of the new Zone Chairmen and I look forward to meeting, and working, with you. Can I also thank the Zone Chairmen who are continuing in service for another year.
- We have made some changes to the District Officers as two very important Officers have now retired from their posts. They have not gone entirely but I thank them for their loyal and professional service in getting 105SC off the ground.
- Our new Secretary is PDG Lion Peter Burnett who takes over from PDG Lion Roger Huntley, our new Treasurer is Lion Tim Hanton who takes over from Lion Linda Picton, our new Sergeant-at-Arms is Lion Dave Rose who takes over from PDG Lion Peter Burnett and our new Global Membership Team leader is IPDG Lion Jarvis Macdonald who takes over from Lion Tim Hanton.

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- We have created a new role of Social Media Support Officer which will be occupied by Lion Dave Rose who has a reputation of helping Clubs around the world understand the complexities of social media. His skills will be most welcome in his own District.
- All Officers, including me, will be contactable via the District's generic email addresses so Clubs and members will not need to change their contact lists.
- Life is currently very challenging with the current pandemic hanging over us but hardly a week goes by where I don't hear about the Clubs which are finding new ways of conducting their monthly meetings and serving their communities. The "New Normal" is becoming quite impressive as Clubs are holding some very professional online meetings, some well supported fundraising events, recruiting and badging up new members and even meeting up with some existing "at large" members who were unable to attend the normal face-to-face meetings and can now attend virtually at home. If you haven't thought about opening up your Zoom meetings to prospective members, then please think about it now and advertise your meeting out to your community via Face-Book, Twitter and websites, etc.
- I know the jury is out on whether to return to our past ways or continue as at present but the old adage of "Your Club, your way" has never been so apt.
- To end, I am going to repeat the last lines of IPDG Lion Jarvis's first article in July last year as I cannot put it better.

Matters of Moment

KEEPING THE PROMISE? From MD 1 05 Vision Officer Lion Sue Taylor Lions continue to answer the call of Helen Keller and remember some 95 years later

Even the most optimistic person at the Lions International Convention on 30 June 1925 in Ohio, USA would have found it hard to imagine that the challenge issued by a blind and deaf woman in a speech to the delegates that lasted under ten minutes would have a continuing impact around the world almost one hundred years later.

Helen Keller, an American author, political activist and lecturer and a tireless advocate for people with disabilities was that woman. Blind and deaf from the age of eighteen months she broke through the isolation imposed by a near complete lack of language to be able to communicate with the help of her exceptional teachers. She went from communicating through sign language, learning to read, write and speak. She was also the first blind and deaf individual to graduate.

Born on 27 June 1880 Keller was 45 years of age when she addressed the Lions Convention and her achievements in life were well known and widely publicised and known to most Lions in the audience, some of whom had involvement with service projects for the blind. She was at the time an ambassador for the American Foundation for the Blind. It is said that witnessing Keller on stage share her emotions for the plight of the blind captivated all who were present. Her most stirring words came at the end of her speech hoping that Lions would partner with the American Foundation for the Blind and lend their support as an organisation to those who had lost their sight.

'Will you not help me hasten the day when there shall be no preventable blindness; no little deaf, blind child untaught; no blind man or woman unaided? I appeal to you Lions, you who have your sight, your hearing, you who are strong and brave and kind. Will you not constitute yourselves knights of the blind in this crusade against darkness?'

It is written that before the Convention was over Lions International unreservedly dedicated itself to making Keller's dream a reality. Lions would become Keller's 'Knights of the Blind'. Since Keller's appeal Lions around the world have changed the lives of hundreds of million people through their vision related work.

This work materialises in many different ways around the globe and around UK, all working towards ending preventable blindness and aiding the visually impaired.

In 1971 the Board of Directors of Lions Clubs International declared that 1 June would be remembered as Helen Keller Day.

Sadly the fight against preventable blindness will never end and our efforts must never fade. Our challenge to engage with sight-related projects that do make a difference is still as strong today as it has ever been.

What can you do as a Lions Club and as an individual Lion that will make a difference?

By embracing the new UK-wide programme **Lions In-Sight** (which replaces the old Lions Eye Health Programme) you really will be able to make a difference to very many visually impaired people across this country. At a national level we are looking at linking Lions Clubs International with Visionary and RNIB in partnership. Then, by linking visionary member organisations (180+ across UK) and RNIB, to individual Lions Clubs across the UK we would together be working to ensuring a better quality of life for visually impaired people.

Lions HQ Birmingham has produced a guide **Developing local partnerships** that will help prepare your Club for possible partnerships, as well as identify and approach potential local partners. (such as your local blind society, Blind Bowlers, Talking Newspapers, etc.).

Another excellent toolkit produced by Lions HQ in Birmingham is a **Service Project Planner for VISION SUPPORT GROUPS** and, as a part of the Lions In-Sight Programme, it's intended to help local Lions Clubs set up, together with their local societies for visually impaired people, groups or activities for blind and partially sighted people.

Guides and toolkits are all on the Lions International Clubs UK website.

I hope by now most of you will have read the article in *The Lion* magazine concerning the LCIF grant that was awarded to MD 105. The grant total is one of the largest that has been awarded during the current pandemic and counts towards the 38 awarded to projects in constitutional area IV (Europe).

The grant for MD 105 supports the amazing and challenging work carried out by Air Ambulance crews up and down the country. The emergency Covid-19 grants have now closed; 292 grants were awarded totalling \$4,744,752. There are still many grants run by LCIF that can be applied for and these will continue to support work carried out by Lions around the world, wherever there is a need. During the fiscal year 2018 – 19, 798 grants total-ling \$40 million were awarded.

If you are interested in the work of your Foundation, LCI are running 'Foundation Friday' webinars that you can register for. Go to the International site, Coronavirus tab and look for Virtual Events in the drop-down box. There are past events that you can catch up on or you can sign up for forthcoming ones. The next is on 10 July from 2.00 to 3.00 pm and will be looking at how Campaign 100 Empowers Service. Please look, particularly if you are interested in putting yourself forward as your Club LCIF Officer. The Annual Report for 2018 -19 is also available to read on the International site and there is a small piece starting on page 35 of the current edition of *The Lion*.

During the 2018 -19 fiscal year, Clubs in this District donated \$49,286. This is an amazing figure and the only words I have are, thank you. The work carried out by Lions worldwide due to receiving a grant and Lions reacting when a natural disaster occurs, these happen because your club has donated to your Foundation.

Lion David Fowler was a member of Basingstoke Lions Club at a time when the Club became too large and had a long waiting list of prospective members waiting to join.

So, it was decided to set up a new Club to serve the area bounded by Basingstoke, Newbury and Reading.

Lion David took a pivotal role in setting up the Loddon Valley Lions Club and became it's first President when it was chartered into the fold of Lions Clubs International in October 1975

Lion David has remained a staunch and enthusiastic member ever since and was elected President again in 1997-98 and for a third time in 2013-14. During the 1990s and early 2000s, he also held various positions on the then District 105D Cabinet. He continues to actively support the Loddon Valley Club today and had it not been for Covid-19 would most likely have celebrated his birthday by helping run the Tadley Treacle Fair, one of the Club's main fundraising events each year, with his wife Pat in charge of the Tea Tent.

Thanking the Club, Lion David said he would endeavour to drain the bottle with alacrity and transfer the Bougainvillea to the garden, where he doubted it would match the magnificence of Mediterranean examples, but promised he would do his best to see that it at least survived!

ND ODIHAM LIONS HELP THEIR **DURING THE PANDEM**

Since mid-April Lions Mark Hazell and John Lancashire have volun-



teered to carry out the delivery service on Wednesday afternoons for the Whitewater Pharmacy in Hook for residents in Hartley Wintney, Hazeley Bottom, Hook, Rotherwick, Mattingley and Greywell. For two weeks in May they covered all the afternoon deliveries while the permanent driver was on sick leave.

The Club have also been taking part in a Lions Project to help schools and children while they have been unable to attend

school. Members hope to assist all nine schools in the area the Club serves and to date have provided ten PCs or lap-tops to pupils from Buryfields Infants in Odiham and Hook Junior and Hook Infants schools. It is hoped to be able to provide more for other schools as PCs and laptops become available.

All eight local schools have been contacted to ask how they could be further helped at this time. To date the Club has supplied money to purchase stationery sets to Greenfield and Oakwood Schools in Hartley Wintney. Funds have been provided for the junior school in Hook to make up lost PTA funds which would have provided additional school meals and online learning platforms and, for the infants, money to buy fruit and vegetables. Schools in Odiham have also been supported making it possible to build a pond at Mayhill Junior School and to assist with free school meals when vouchers were not available for pupils at Buryfields Infant School.

To date the Club has helped nearly 1800 children.

The Club also hopes to be able to help Robert Mays School in Odiham which is the senior school for our area and Whitewater Primary school in Rotherwick and Long Sutton Primary School.

Bradford on Avon Lion climbs Mt Everest!

The Club is operating a call coordinating service for a team of volunteers helping residents who are either selfisolating, shielding or vulnerable to connect with local volunteer helpers. The Hub responds to requests ranging from shopping, collection of prescriptions, collection of *Click and Collect* from supermarkets.

Looking ahead Windsor Lions are planning their very popular Santa Sleigh outings and very much hope that they can go ahead during the run up to Christmas provided Santa hasn't had to furlough his Elves!

The Lions and Lockdown

Wimborne and Ferndown Lions Club, like many similar groups, have been trying to continue their activities as best they can during the national lockdown. At first, in March, we concluded that we would simply have to wait. But as it became clear that the lockdown period would be a lot longer than had been hoped, other ideas were sought.



Thanks to the initiative of Lion Dan (top left in picture) we were introduced to the Zoom video conferencing app, now familiar to many people, and Lion Dan organised us to hold virtual club meetings. At the time of writing (mid May) we have held three such meetings. There have been a few hiccups, to do with passwords and positioning the home cameras, but it works.

Since not everyone in the Club has the equipment needed, the meetings have been informal and enjoyable social occasions as you can see. Whether we develop this format for formal meetings remains to be seen and obviously depends on when and how lockdown restrictions are lifted.

One of our members, Lion Joan, has made 575 scrubs bags for nurses to send their scrubs in straight to the laundry. These have gone to Dorchester and Poole hospitals and elsewhere.

PDGs Lions John and Judith Goodchild (Loddon Valley and Hook & Odiham Clubs respectively) had planned a five week tour of Malaysia, New Zealand, Australia and Singapore, leaving Singapore almost immediately prior to the Covid-19 Lockdown.

During their time in Australia, it had been arranged to stay for ten days with a friend of Judith's, who lives about fifteen miles south of Sydney. Lo and behold, they discovered that the Kogarah Lions Club (District 201N5) met at an Australian equivalent of our British Legion Clubs situated just a three minute walk from their friend's house and were due a meeting during their stay. Contact was made and they were told they would be made most welcome at that meeting.

Lion John explained that the British Lions had a project to provide the Australian Lions with specialised water tanks in the fight against the recent bush fires which had been raging and received a spontaneous round of applause when he told the Australians that his Club had donated sufficient money to purchase one tank. Comments were heard, "Those tanks don't come cheap". Fortunately the fires had not taken hold in the area served by the Kogarah Club.

A pleasant and convivial evening was enjoyed by all, exchanging notes about the activities of the three Clubs, with Lion Judith explaining that her Club too, had made a donation towards the cost of a water tank and also how her Club had negotiated a grant from LCIF for a project at an eye hospital in Uganda.

It is traditional at such meetings for the Clubs to exchange bannerettes and our picture shows Lions John

Since 1 April, the Wokingham Lions Club has been running weekly virtual pub quizzes on Facebook, organised by Lion Ian Grange. Since pubs will be opening soon, the last pub quiz takes place on Thursday, 2 July.

So far, the Club has raised more than £3,900 from quiz participants, which has been donated to the Wokingham Borough Community Hub, to support individuals and families in need. In addition, the Club donated another £1,000 from a grant from Lions District funds, bringing the total so far to £4,900.

Emma Cantrell CEO, First Days Children's Charity, one of the partners at Wokingham Borough Community Hub, said: "We would like to thank everyone who has participated in the Great #Woky Pub Quizzes over the last 14 weeks. The donations you've made have helped us send out more than 4,500 food parcels, supporting hundreds of families in our Borough through Covid-19. It's with the support of all of those who take part in wonderful activities such as The Great #Woky Pub Quiz that allow us to be there for those who need us. We cannot thank you all enough!"

Lion Ian Grange, the quiz organiser at Wokingham Lions added: "What I've been really pleased with is not just the money that has been raised to support Covid-19 relief in our community, but also the sense of fun and community the quiz has generated amongst those taking part. I'm really going to miss running it on Thursday nights. But I hope we can go out with a bang at our final quiz on 2 July!"

The Great #Woky Pub Quiz takes place on Thursday evenings at 8.00 pm and is live-streamed over Facebook, with more than 250 teams taking part each week, and over a quarter of a million minutes of quiz video being viewed to date on the Facebook page



@WokinghamLions. More than 700 questions have been asked, which have been set by the Wokingham Lions. Special guests at the quiz have included new Wokingham Town Council Mayor Cllr Tony Lack, and a live link-up with Jono Holmes on BBC Radio Berkshire.

Friend's and families who can't be together have formed virtual teams, with Wokingham members being joined by friends and family across the UK and the world, including players in New Zealand, Sweden, Singapore, Canada, Portugal and the USA.

Guides and toolkits are all on the Lions International Clubs UK website As a unintended pilot for the Lions In-Sight Programme, the six Lions Clubs in Northumberland were approached by their local society for the blind, NCBA, for volunteers to provide a telephone support service of 600+ vulnerable visually impaired people during COVID-19. This is working very well, and outcomes for visually impaired people - and the people who are phoning them - is excellent. (I know, I am one of the Lions volunteers) We were intending to launch the new Lions In-Sight Programme at the 2020 Birmingham Convention, but ... So I am now working with Lions HQ on two new Sight leaflets/posters and looking at how best to ensure everyone's involvement.

Another way to meet the challenge is through the **collection of unwanted** and damaged spectacles which are sent to Chichester Lions Club which processes tens of thousands of recycled spectacles each year. Sorted spectacles are then sent for grading and distribution to Medico France in Le Havre. Spectacles are also sent directly to contacts running eye clinics in Papua New Guinea, Sri Lanka, Ghana, Nigeria and Nepal. In addition, volunteers from the 'Unite for Sight' charity are supplied with spectacles to take with them on missions to countries across the world. Although this recycling programme is on hold at the moment, it will restart as soon as possible. As your Sight Officer I have been investigating how many Clubs actually participate in this programme, and where they collect old specs from. I very much hope that by sharing this valuable information we can encourage even more Clubs to join in.

Lions and Sight Savers - Since 1970s Lions and SightSavers have worked together. Lions Sight Savers is a registered charity that in the past year has donated more than £100,000 to SightSavers' work in India and Africa (adult sight-restoring cataract surgery). A huge 'thank you' comes to all the Lions Clubs across the UK from Sightsavers for their incredible support.

All these Lions Programs as well as the Clubs and individual Lions who support them are wonderful examples of the ongoing efforts to meet the challenge issued almost 95 years ago. How will you and your Club support the challenge?
