We have helped our Food Banks, helped deliver medicines and food stuffs to the self-isolating and helped our schools in many ways including Zone 2E who have refurbished and delivered PCs and laptops to schools so that children could work at home.

December is normally one of the busiest months for Lions Clubs but this year will be less so for many. Covid-19 has meant that many Clubs have either given up their sleigh runs altogether or changed them so that they are driving through and not stopping to knock on doors as normal or are doing static events. You can get pre-paid collection envelopes or boxes plus further details by completing a request form on their website https://www.rnib.org.uk/donations-and-fundraising/fundraising-your-community/stamps-appeal/get-your-pre-paid-envelopes or calling the helpline on 0303 123 9999.

Another form of recycling which can be done at any time of year is hearing aids. Small quantities of these can be sent by post to Dr. Michael Nolan, Lumb Gaps Barn, Haslington Old Road, Rawtenstall, Rossendale, Lancashire BB4 8TT. Larger quantities (up to 15kg) can be shipped using Hermes - see https://wwwmyhermes.co.uk. PLEASE do not send batteries or boxes just the aids. Alternatively, send them to Chichester Lions when they are open again. If you are sending to Chichester could you let me know how many you are sending so that I can forward the number to the MD Officer as Chichester do not record where the hearing aids come from.




Petersfield Lions raise awareness of World Food Day

President Lion Judy Hill responded by stating that Sarah had done amazing work in bringing Windsor Foodshare thus far and the Windsor Lions were proud to be a part of it. "We wish the new team the best of luck in continuing to grow the project and pledge our ongoing support."

Bracknell Lions partnership with Wildridings School

After a successful collection back in February, Bracknell Forest Lions have once again teamed up with Wildridings Primary School to collect items for the Foodbank.

November collection

On Thursday 5 November, Club members operated a socially distanced collection at Wildridings School where generous families donated more than 350 items, including long-life foodstuffs and gifts for Christmas. Over the year, they have contributed more than 700 items to the Foodbank which provides local families locked in poverty with emergency food and support.

60% increase in food parcels needed

In September this year, the Trussel Trust which runs foodbanks all over the United Kingdom forecast a 61 per cent increase in food parcels would be needed between October and December and this was prior to the seconds lockdown being announced. Families with children are the hardest hit by Covid-19 and this year around half the people who have used the foodbanks have never needed one before.

Organiser Lion Clare Dowling said, "We are very grateful to the school for helping us help others. All the school community were involved to make this a success and special thanks to headteacher Mr Cope."



A sponsored walk inspired by other Lions Clubs

In September Bracknell Lions were wracking their brains working out how to raise funds to support local charities, since they had missed out on raising the thousands they could have expected from the annual Bracknell Show.

It was Lion Marcia who suggested that instead, to raise funds, the Club create and take part in a socially distanced sponsored walk over a weekend. Arranging the walk was hard because the guidelines for social distancing prevented the use of the fields where the Bracknell Show would have been staged to start as a group in a spirit of friendship and fellowship. Instead, participants had to walk alone or in small groups, keeping their distance!

Club members challenged themselves to walk a total of 100 miles over the weekend as a group (the Club has just 13

members). In fact they achieved a very laudable 166 miles one member even running 50 miles and raised £1,000!

The walk was great fun and did good for the Club members' morale, their physical and mental health, was great for social media interaction and a very pleasing result in every way.





Sentinel's eye on...

Card Readers

A number of requests have been received from Clubs regarding 'card readers' that will enable them to move away from handling cash, especially in these difficult times where people have minimal cash on them. One or two Clubs are thinking of what to use for Christmas Collections and 'Santa Sleigh' activities etc.

Card Readers supplied by banks tend to be very expensive and work on a monthly fee, which is not ideal for Lions Clubs who may only use them occasionally.

There are a number of 'pay for use' providers in the market one of which, iZettle, has been highly recommended and it is one that our Club has used for a couple of years now.

The reader is simple to use, you only pay when you use it (approx. 1.5 per cent commission) once you have purchased it for around £25 and you can get itemised readouts of your transactions immediately.

You attach the Bluetooth reader to any phone; you need a 4G WiFi internet connection, and you are ready to proceed. Payment is into a nominated bank account in around 3-4 days. For audit purposes, every transaction can be accessed and reports are available. Their helpline is complimented too.

There are other suppliers, e.g., FourSquare and SumUp (www.sumup.co.uk). World Pay and PayPal tend to be better for larger volumes of use, due to cost. Uttoxeter Lions Club have apparently negotiated a one-off card terminal payment fee of £30.00 and each transaction is 1 per cent, with PayPal; this may be worth further investigation.
