



# ENVIRONMENTAL POSTER COMPETITION

This competition was started in 2012 but has never been well supported. In July 2013 Cabinet decreed that competitions which attracted less than five entries should be discontinued.

The Environmental Poster Competition was allowed to continue as it was a new venture and needed time to grow in popularity. Unfortunately this did not happen and reluctantly I proposed at the last Cabinet meeting that the competition be discontinued. Cabinet agreed and therefore there will not be a contest this year.

# SIGHT SAVERS TRUST

Over the last 40 years over £3.9 million has been raised by Lions to help thousands of people across Africa and Asia to stop going blind

Recently, during the pandemic, not only have many people been able to spend time those closest to them but they have been unable to receive life-changing eye health treatments.

Sightsavers needs your support to improve the number of services and to reduce the backlog of people needing treatment including cataract surgery. Their vision is a world where no-one is blind from avoidable causes, and people with visual impairments and other disabilities can participate equally in society.

You can make a difference by sending a donation via the District Treasurer, for Lions Sight Savers in the normal way.

### What would the money be used for?

- £30 would pay for an adult cataract surgery
- £90 would pay for a child cataract surgery
- £500 would fund the training of 100 health workers to complete their training in primary health care
  - £1,000 would enable screen of a community of more than 1,200 people for a range of eye conditions

### In 2019 Sight Savers' supporters helped:

- perform 472,499 eye operations
- prescribe 493, 186 pairs of glasses
- screen 5 million children and adults for eye conditions

This is valuable work and the costs such as cataract operations or a pair of glasses are relatively low but can make a life changing effect to someone. Over a billion people in the world have a condition that could be easily treated or prevented. I know what a difference having a cataract removed can make so please consider making a donation to Lions Sight Savers.

### Into the Reading Lions' Den



In 2017 Reading Lions were looking for more ways to reach out to the local community. Their many and varied fundraising activities had provided a sizeable amount in the Charity Account and members were looking forward to spending it. At a brainstorming session Lion Jo Hamblin told of an interesting project pioneered by Fleet Lions. Instantly the Club knew that this idea held great promise. Lion Jo adapted the format and Reading Lions' Den was born.

Applications from local community groups and small local charities who are asked to complete a questionnaire. They must supply details about the project on which they plan to spend the grant, assure the Club that it will benefit the local community and also provide a brief description of the wider aims and objectives of their group. Initially, in 2017, grants were awarded up to a maximum of £500, in 2021 the maximum was £750.

Each group is allocated to two Lions who will do thorough research on them and move on to interview them if their application should be successful. The interviews last from ten to 15 minutes and the applicants will know within a week if they have been successful and how much they have been awarded.

Club members cannot compare themselves to the interviewing panel on TV's Dragons' Den, but it is a remarkably interesting and rewarding experience. What a way to discover so many valuable local community charities and groups and to meet so many positive and selfless, hard working people trying to make a difference in their community. To be honest, at first, members were stunned. Why weren't Lions aware that so much was going on? Groups providing sensory gardens and horticultural therapy for adults with mental health issues, brave people caring for young people in trouble on the streets of Reading at night-time, a train club set up to help autistic children and many, many more.

In 2017 the Club awarded a total of £6,000 to 18 recipients and this year the figures were £10,752 awarded to 20 recipients. Over the years some financial support has been received from Savills Estate Agents, who have also joined the interview panel. In 2019 the event was held at the Conference Centre at the Madejski Stadium, but this year the Club resorted to Zoom - just as successful, judging by the excellent feedback received.

Over the four events held, the Club has distributed  $\pm 34,250.00$  in grants to 72 local community groups, an extremely rewarding experience for all involved, interviewers and applicants alike.

Reading Lions heartily recommend this method of reaching out to the community.


