### The new DG's Leader...

### My Fellow Lions ...

am delighted to welcome you all to our new Lionistic year of 2021-22.

In December 2019 I was busy visiting Clubs and getting to understand my future role. My Club had been doing its normal activities during that month, but we all heard on the news of an outbreak of a virus on the other side of the planet. It was so far away, how could it impact us? But it did, and the world was stopped in its tracks for us all in March 2020.

Now, 15 months on from the first lockdown, we are looking forward to late July when we finally emerge from the tumultuous time that we have all shared, suffered and lost. Where we have been able, our family of Lions have adapted and continued to serve and the world we emerge into will be different: we will all have changed.

After I was elected as your District Governor Elect at our Virtual Convention (many thanks to Lion Tom and his excellent team for that, and for their support of the other Districts and not least the MD Convention), I said the following:

The District team will work hard to ensure that we can support you in gaining and retaining members through our membership team; supporting your service via our service team and to support effective training for all those that require it via our leadership training team.

These may be separate teams, but they all work together for our common goals, through service we attract members, through new members we can extend our service and through leadership training we provide the necessary skills for Lions to lead their clubs, seek new members and plan and carry out successful service events.

From this my DG strap line for Lions Year 2021/22 emerged:

### Through Service We Grow

When the Lions are finally let loose on the world, we will be able to return to the events that we did previously, but I also hope that we have had time to reflect and find new things and perhaps continue and expand upon our newfound 'virtual' skills. As Lions we have to embrace change, not be afraid of it, but take control of it and use it to our advantage—an excellent quote from Helen Keller:

"A bend in the road is not the end of the road... unless you fail to make the turn."

So, let's combine our new and old skills in our new world.

In developing our District structure, I have had to make some changes to the Zones so that there are enough Clubs that can then work together and support each other. Zones F and G which were four Clubs each will join as a single Zone of eight Clubs, and Zones H and I (two and five Clubs respectively), will join to create a new Zone of seven clubs).

We have some new Zone Chairmen this year, Lions Richard High, Mark Thorpe, Net Cooper and Paul Allaway who will be ably supported by the continuing Zone chairs.

#### Service from the heart will guide our way

I have worked with the team leaders of Service, Membership, Leadership and Youth to ensure that they do have teams to lead and to share the workload. This has made it possible to bring in new Lions from the District to support us all, but without unduly burdening them with 'Cabinet', unless they need to present ideas for discussion or decision. Their focus is on how they can help Clubs thrive.

A new role has emerged within the membership team that will impact across all we do. The role is our New Voices Officer, Lion Diane Hopkins. Everyone needs their voice to be heard and as Lions we are champions of diversity, everyone has an equal voice.

A key change has been the reinvigoration of the Youth Team led by Lion Robert Armstrong-Collett, which will allow Lion Yorky to focus 100 per cent on Young Ambassador.

Building on the work in 2020-21 the PR and Marketing Team is now truly a team that will be able to support the whole District.

These teams have meant that others have been able to give their time in service to us all and get involved in the overall betterment of our District and to learn and grow to be our future leaders.

The District officers have a good mix of new and continuing Lions, and I thank them all for their service to us all. Never forget we are all volunteers in service. The Lions Clubs International strapline continues to be 'We Serve' but International President Lion Douglas X. Alexander's personal message to us says it all.

## Global Service Team News - July 2021

### CHANGES IN GST

We are now at the beginning of another Lionistic year and there have been changes in the way GST is run in 105SC. Basically we are reverting to the old Community Service pattern which is more in line with the MD model. It will mean that I have much more support and that different officers will be writing to you from time to time.

### SIGHT

I am pleased to say that Chichester Lions are now receiving donations of used specs. ### ENVIRONMENT

At the latest MD GST meeting it was suggested that Lions support **The Queens Green Canopy** a project in recognition of Her Majesty's 70th year and it proposed that Lions Clubs plant 70,000 trees.

This would mean that if each Club planted 420 trees the target would be reached. It was suggested that members could adopt trees as individuals.

#### Where to get the trees?

The Woodland Trust, through their Free Tree Pack scheme, offers free saplings to schools and community groups looking to plant on public/communal land. Through the scheme there are two deliveries each year - one in March and the other in November - to coincide with tree planting season over the winter months. The Woodland Trust are now taking applications for the **November 2021** delivery via their online application form, which can be found <a href="https://example.com/here">here</a> along with details about the different packs/mixes available. Applications for the November delivery are due to close around mid-August.

The trees supplied are young 1-2 year saplings (about 20-60 cm tall), a good age for the trees to establish in new ground conditions and after about eight years could reach an adult's head-height. All packs also come with 60 cm plastic spiral guards and bamboo canes to protect the saplings from rabbits and other small mammals.

For reference: a small pack (30 trees) will cover around the size of one tennis court or create around eight metres of double-row hedging, a medium pack (105 trees) will cover about four tennis courts or create around 25 metres of double-row hedging, and a large pack (420 trees) will cover a football pitch or create about 85 metres double-row hedging. The Woodland Trust offer a maximum of four different packs to each group, up to a total 420 trees.

You would need to identify a suitable plot of land and liaise with the legal landowner to agree the tree planting and ongoing maintenance of the young trees. A Club member would then complete an online application form and select a suitable number of trees in their order.

Applications are checked individually against eligibility criteria.

Applications will close around mid-August, there is no flexibility to add extra orders after the deadline as the scheme is hugely popular, delivering over one million trees each year. The Woodland Trust cannot create bespoke orders, it's a case of choosing the closest suitable tree packs for the planting objectives. Trees are usually delivered over the first 2-3 weeks of November. It is therefore suggested that any tree planting events are arranged for late-November or even December - the trees can happily be stored outside for many weeks before they need planting in the ground.

### CHILDHOOD CANCER

September is Children and Cancer Month

The MD Officer has suggested that you maybe contact your Regional Paediatric Oncology Unit to ask if there is anything they need or would like but also if your funds are somewhat limited you could maybe think about toys, books, games, crayons, etc. for the playroom. If you have a talented artist in your midst, you may be able to draw a large Lion which they could colour, cut and paste or dot to dot for the playroom!!! Our regional unit is very probably Southampton but if not they could advise you where to contact. (023 8120 3603)

They are a registered charity who provide unique customised shoes hand painted and personalised for our really brave children and young people. ## GETTING TO THE HEART OF DEFIBRILLATORS IN WINDSOR

Following the recent high-profile use of a defibrillator at the European Football Championship match in Copenhagen which helped to save the life of Danish player, Christian Erikson, there has been an upturn in interest in these lifesaving pieces of medical technology.

The Windsor Community Defibrillator Partnership made up of members of the Lions Club of Windsor, the Rotary Club of Windsor St George, Windsor Street Angels, Thames Valley Police and Windsor Town Partnership. Their mission is to raise money for placing publicly accessible Automatic External Defibrillators (AEDs) in and around Windsor.

WCDP were aware that Windsor town centre did not have defibrillators that could be publicly accessed 24 hours a day. Several premises had equipment, but they were not accessible out of hours for a number of reasons, and none were in the town main thoroughfares. WCDP raised funds from donations, and has to-date installed 15 publicly accessible AEDs with a full quardianship programme to ensure they are always fully equipped and in good working order, with another five **AEDs funded and locations identified** for installation. They also have the knowledge about the best way to help save a life by utilising these kits and, importantly, where they can be found.

Eastleigh and Swanwick Lions have been busy getting ready for the duckrace taking place on the River Itchen on Bank Holiday Monday 30 August. You might imagine that there is only a bit of work on the day; dropping the ducks into the river and scooping them up afterwards. Notwithstanding a few Lions spent an afternoon and evening preparing.



Imagine rather a lot of black bin bags full of mucky, numbered yellow plastic ducks. The numbers on the ducks' bottoms correspond to the numbers on tickets bought by the public. Thus it's vital to ensure that ducks from the previous race did not go paddling off on their own and the ducks' numbers and the ticket numbers match. So with military precision, 2,500 ducks were cleaned, renumbered and put back into numbered bin bags.

Thanks to the Lion's wife who kept the team of Eastleigh and Swanwick Lions refreshed with cups of tea and the efforts of those involved, the task was done in a much shorter time than anticipated.

There's still lots to do before the big day, in particular selling a ticket for every duck that's taking part. Tickets for the ducks are available from time to time at the Club kiosk in Riverside Park and the intended Lions pop-up shop in Eastleigh's Swan Centre. There will be lots of prizes with £250 for the owner of the victorious duck.



# It's time to get back in the water - Windsor Lions Swimathon 2021 is launched!

Windsor Lions are delighted to announce they are back on track and are launching their popular Swimathon. This event, which allows local groups, clubs, schools, businesses and charities to raise money for themselves or their favourite good cause, will be held on Sunday 10 October at the Windsor Leisure Centre. Teams of up to six adults (eight for under 16s) may enter and will swim, relay style for just under an hour to raise money for their chosen cause.

The event has proved very popular over its 24 year history and has raised over £200,000 for local and national good causes including many Guide and Scout groups and local charities such as Blue Acre Stables and the Thames Valley Adventure Playground.

Event organiser Lion Mike Sells has been involved with the event from its start. He gave his view on the secret of its success. "People love our Swimathon because they can keep every penny they raise for their chosen cause. In essence, Windsor Lions stage the event and all the wonderful participants from a wide variety of organisations do all the hard work with the swimming!"

The trip was planned for last year but delayed to this. Nick is 75 years old and one of the oldest people to take on the challenge unsupported, and generously did so to raise funds for his Club. Just before the end of the Lions year, Lion Nick reached his goal in good shape after more than a thousand miles of determined cycling and donations stood at well over twice his fund-raising target.

#### Lions on the Green

A completely new venture took shape during the darker days of the 2020 lockdowns. Lions on the Green was the first significant outdoor event for many months.

On a colourful summer's day the public flocked to see more than 100 classic cars on display. There were entertainments for children and stalls for local artisans and charities. The event took place at The Walter Arms in Sindlesham, with honorary member Town Mayor Cllr Tony Lack and Mayoress Claire Lack in attendance.



Outgoing President Lion Nigel Page (right) thanked the members in attendance, who were all thrilled to meet in person for the first time this year. He said: "It has been a challenging year, especially as far as fund raising is concerned. Many charities have struggled to raise any funds during the year, yet Wokingham Lions raised more than £16,000, most of which has gone to local charities."

### **Wokingham Lions Club will donate £4,500 to nine local charities**

These funds were provided by more than 500 walkers who participated in the Wokingham Walk on Sunday 23 May.
