I am looking after Vision until a District Officer is appointed. If you are interested in fulfilling this essential role please contact the DG. We have had our first GST meeting and will be holding more throughout the year. We are all here to help you, so please contact us if you have any query on any of the projects. We will be keeping in touch with you by articles in the Sentinel and by the District Newsletter. At the appropriate time we will be encouraging you to mark special days such as World Sight Day and World Diabetes Day and giving you ideas as to what you can do to mark them.

However service also includes anything that Clubs do to help their communities and the wider world. Sometimes these are donations to local organisations such as food banks or Brain Tumour Research but they also include hands-on service. One good thing about the pandemic is that restrictions and health problems allowing, Clubs have been able to provide more of this which is at the heart of Lionism. Delivering groceries and medicines to self-isolating people and marshalling at vaccination centres became the norm for some Lions and this is as important, if not more so, that supporting the five pillars of service. In fact, almost anything we do as Lions can be interpreted as service. Our fund raising activities such as fetes and fireworks displays are not only providing us with income but are giving pleasure to our communities and should be reported as service. Not only should these events be recorded on MyLion but they should be proclaimed and written about in your local press. In the past Lions have been described as a 'best kept secret' and we need to change that. Publicity will help your Club and, as they say 'actions speak louder than words', this hopefully the public will be imoressed by what we do. In any event make sure you have publicity material available and be prepared to answer questions about Lions. This can encourage people to take an active interest in becoming a Lion and thus DG Lion Brian's strapline is achieved.

Whatever you do, please record it on the MyLion website using the Service Reporting webpage. It is not perfect but can be adapted to your use. Some questions are mandatory but others do not need to be completed, e.g. sums donated or funds raised can be ignored when a Hand On service is recorded.

Lions matters of moment



The Worldwide Week of Service in Sight takes place from Monday to Sunday 11to 18 October with World Sight Day being on Thursday 15 October. Sight or vision has been at the heart of Lions' service since 1925 when Helen Keller asked us to be "Knights of the Blind" and it continues as one part of the five pillars of the GST programme.

During the week of service, and especially on World Sight Day, Clubs are asked to do something to help the blind or visually impaired or to raise awareness of vision issues within their community. Some ideas:

Many Clubs collect used specs so why not make 15
October an extra special day for collecting them;
If you have a club which supports the blind in your
community why not do something special for them
during October or help a blind person in your area.;

Make the community aware of one of the difficulties of being blind or having low vision by arranging a blind-folded walk for your club and a local dignatory, such as the Mayor, to experience problems of obstacles on pavements. Believe me there are more than you realise!

Volunteer to create audio recordings of books and periodicals for people who cannot see.

If you just want to donate to Sight Projects then consider Sight Savers, Guide Dogs for the Blind, the Macular Society or Living Paintings.

Sponsor a football in the A Ball for All Details of this scheme which aims to change the lives of visually impaired children throughout the world were sent out in July by the District Secretary

Whatever you do please remember to record it on the MyLion web site and let me know what you do.

By now many of you will be aware of the terrible flooding that took place recently in parts of Europe. As with other terrible disasters that have occurred around the world and affected many Lions and their communities, LCIF has begun to respond by preparing a \$100,000 catastrophe grant, which will be administered by Lions on the ground.

To continue to be able to respond when these kinds of tragedies occur and to support Lions who wish to undertake projects within their communities, our Foundation relies on the generosity of donations from Clubs around the world to support it.

We have experienced a very difficult time recently and we know fundraising has not been easy. I wish to thank the Clubs of 105 SC who donated \$29,905.41 between 1 July 2020 and 30 Jun3 2021.

Any cheque which has no clear destination will go towards the Korle Bu Eye Teaching Hospital in Ghana, which is a MD project, this has been agreed with LCIF.

MARKETING - ART OR SCIENCE? - PART 1

Look up 'marketing' in the Oxford Dictionary and what you get is brief and to the point - the promotion and selling of goods or services. As one of today's marketing totems would say: "Simple".

Even when we use the term in a Lions context that brief definition still says it all.

But first a couple of aphorisms. "The world will beat a path to the door of the man who makes a better mousetrap", coined by Ralph Waldo Emerson late in the 19th century (hence he could say 'man' not person). Coined, by among others Lion Peter Tabb, while lecturing on marketing at the local college of further education, "Not to promote is like blinking in the dark. Only you know what you are doing."

Too often Lions Clubs believe that Emerson got it right which is when they are blinking in the dark. The world will only beat a path to the door of the guy with the mousetrap if the world knows he's got it.

Lions Clubs International may be the world's largest and most active community service organisation but there is still an awful lot of people in our own communities who don't know that. Because no matter how furiously we blink, if we do it in the dark...

So let's spread a little light around.

Despite the simplicity of the definition, marketing is not a single discipline, it is an encompassing term for many – promotions, public relations, advertising, sales techniques, mainstream and social media management - all of which have a part to play in the marketing mix.

The headline poses the question. Is marketing an art or science. Marketers will insist that it is discipline with procedures without which it is doomed to fail. It is a science. Many who have roles in the advertising and public relations elements of marketing will insist that successful marketing relies just as much, even more so, on creativity and that's an art.

This article is a taster for what's to come in future editions. We will explore how to use marketing and all its techniques to make sure that when your Club blinks, everyone knows about it.

Jersey Lions Swimarathon raises £65,000 and counting

Almost £65,000 was raised by this year's Jersey Lions Swimarathon which took place from Saturday to Wednesday 3 to 7 July.

With fewer teams than in any year in the past decade, the five-day event, which is Jersey's biggest sporting fund-raiser, finally happened after the 2020 event was cancelled. In past years, around 450 teams would take part by this year that number was reduced to 283, circa 2000 swimmers).

Despite having only two thirds of the usual number of teams participating due to concerns around Covid-19, the Jersey Lions organising committee was thrilled with the result. "Given all the circumstances and with teams cancelling just hours before they were due to swim, things were occasionally fraught," says organising committee chairman Lion Steve Taylor. "Our warm thanks to everyone who took part and to our sponsors Ravenscroft for being such a supportive partner." The final total raised won't be known for a few weeks as moneys from JustGiving and other sources heve yet to be taken into account.

The greater proportion of the moneys raised will be split between five principal beneficiaries - local charities dedicated to enable young people to thrive - and the Jersey Lions charity account.

Despite the loss of the 2020 Swimarathon, the Jersey Club was still able to donate almost £35,000 in the 2020-2021 Lions year to local charities and good causes.

ENVIRONMENT BY THE BOOK

Primary, Infant and Junior schools in Alton and the surrounding villages have a vibrant and engaging addition to their libraries thanks to Alton Lions Club.

The donation of a set of six books about the environment was offered to each school as an environmental project for the last Lions year.

Part of the Wild Tribe Heroes series, the books are written by Ellie Jackson, teacher and mother of four young children, to help educate primary and preschool children about global environmental issues. They were promoted in the April edition of the Sentinel by the Global Action Team and picked up by Alton's newly formed environmental group who researched and adopted the books as their first project.

Project leader Lion Sarah O'Donoghue said the schools were delighted with the offer and the books have now been delivered.

Each book tells the story of an animal that is in serious trouble because of human behaviour. For example: a turtle eats a plastic bag it has mistaken for a jellyfish; a koala is burned in a forest fire made more likely by global warming; and an orangutan is in trouble due to the destruction of its

forest home. All the animals are rescued giving a happy ending to each story.

Each book also contains facts about the featured animals and others that share their environment. The children are encouraged to discuss the issues raised by the stories and to help address them in small, manageable ways.
