In the longer term we can seek to support the co-ordinated efforts via VCS that will be looking to call on service organisations such as Lions to provide the practical support in the effort, MD105 being a partner organisation of VCS.

SIGHT

Don't forget that Thursday14 October is World Sight Day. Please let me know how you will be marking this day.

Please note that Chichester Lions are currently not receiving used specs as they have been overwhelmed recently and do not have the necessary storage facilities.

DIABETES

Don't forget that Sunday 14 November is World Diabetes Day. 2021 marks the 100th anniversary of the discovery of how to extract insulin which changed the life of people with diabetes. The first person to receive insulin by injection, on 11 January 1922, was Leonard Thompson, a 14-year-old boy who was dying from Type 1 diabetes. While it lowered his blood sugars, he was left with an abscess at the injection site and he still had high levels of ketones. This led to the insulin being purified and on 23 January 1922 a second injection was a complete success with Leonard's blood sugar levels becoming near normal and with no obvious side effects.

ENVIRONMENT

More ways to recycle:

INK CARTRIDGES USING THE INK BIN

This company was established in 2019 as a fresh and new way to tackle plastic pollution. It is focused on returning ink cartridges back into the circular economy in a closed loop.

Charities can collect used cartridges and then send them to the lnk Bin free of charge and get paid for doing so! All it costs is £35 for an initial bin to store the cartridges. For full information go to theinkbin.co.uk

BLISTER PACKS

Used blister packs are produced every day as we complete our medications. Often a month's supply can come in four-packs and the amounts of used packs build up quickly. These are hard to recycle but there are currently 2 UK wide high street companies who will accept them for recycling. Superdrug operate in our District except for Jersey and Guernsey. You can drop off any type of old blister pack in special boxes inside the stores. In addition, TerraCycle, who recycle the packs, will donate points to Superdrug

pharmacies to be redeemed into financial donations for Marie Curie. Furthermore, Superdrug will recycle old electrical appliances free when you buy a new one from them. For more information go to https://www.superdrug.com > dgfs > wasterecycling.

Boots also have a recycling programme which encourages people to recycle empty beauty, health and wellness products, from any brand, which can't be recycled at home. You can register so that you can receive Boots Advantage Card points by using your mobile phone. More details at https://www.boots.com > boots-recycling-scheme

ATTENTION CLUB OFFICERS/TRUSTEES REGULATORY ALERT

Recently one of our Clubs received a 'Regularity Alert' from the Charities Commission. This Alert mean that the Club is under threat to lose its charitable status. This is because of the failure of their accountants to carry out trustee-delegated tasks to complete the CIO process and the submission of accounts and annual reports as required by the Commission.

The Trustee Training sessions are designed to ensure that trustees learn about their duties and in particular that delegating tasks to others does not absolve them from the accountability of the task. In addition, Zone chairmen have a responsibility to ensure that the Clubs in their Zone are adhering to good governance practices and ensuring that they fulfil their lawful responsibilities to the Charities Commission.

The next 'Duties of a Lions Charitable Trustee' takes place on Sunday 31 October via Zoom.

MARKETING - PART 3 ABOUT ADVERTISING

"Not to advertise is like blinking in the dark, only you know what you are doing." Thus spake many others and Lion Peter Tabb.

So where in the marketing mix does advertising fit?

Advertising is the audio-visual expression of marketing at work.

So let's examine it.

Advertising sets out to do just three things, to inform, to persuade and to remind.

Unlike PR, advertising allows you to say what you want to say, where you want to say it and when you want to say it. It comes in two forms – above the line and below the line (advertising jargon). Above the line are the media – press, radio, tv and social media and below the line are posters, banners and hoardings and direct mail. Whether above or below, the purpose will be the same. To inform, to persuade and to remind. However, the most significant difference is that advertising has a price tag. You have to buy it.

So how do we do this? What are the rules?

We decide what it is we want to inform. We define what it is that will persuade the target audience and if we have already done that, what will remind that target audience.

Informing involves information – in our case it's more often than not what's on where. Persuasion is that information which in advertising we call it a selling proposition, that will convince the target audience to the action we want and reminding will do that all over again. And keep it simple.

Advertising gurus will advise that any product or service benefits from having a *unique* selling proposition. That proposition is what distinguishes our product and/or service from anybody else's. But remember that unique means unique.

Advertising cannot exist without an advertising medium — whether it's above or below the line where your advertisement is to be seen or heard is as important as what it is saying. Successful advertising requires the right message in or on the right medium. For instance, a detailed press advertisement does not transfer well to a roadside hoarding. One can be quite detailed, the other has to be big and bold without small print.

Many Clubs will avoid advertising because of its perceived cost. A successful way to overcome that barrier is to seek a sponsor. For many organisations sponsoring a Lions advertisement is an inexpensive way of allying themselves to a good cause that reflects well on them. You will be advertising, they will get good PR. That's marketing at work.

Windsor Lions have chalked up another fantastic event with the return of their Cross Country Ride on 11 and 12 September.

After last year's event was cancelled due to Covid restrictions, riders flocked back to take up the chance to ride in beautiful Windsor Great Park and raise funds for a variety of local good causes, including Riding for the Disabled and NHS charities. In a colourful touch, instead of the usual single coloured rosette, riders took home rainbow favours to show support for the NHS.

The ride enabled more than 550 riders to enjoy the Deer Park within Windsor Great Park and tackle up to 30 professional jumps of novice and intermediate standard, all carefully constructed and safeguarded by Windsor Lions. The event has a long history having run almost unbroken every year since the mid 1970s and to date has raised more than £1,5 million. Many participants return year after year to enjoy the special privilege the event affords its riders. Comments this year after the event included "We had an absolutely fantastic day in the Park. Thank you, Windsor Lions".

Speaking of the event, its co-ordinator Lion Mark Fraser said that it was so pleasing to get the Club 'back in the saddle' and see so many riders doing likewise in the park. "The weather was perfect and riders and Lions alike had a great time. The bonus is that we raise tens of thousands of pounds for great causes. We can't wait to do it again next year and hope the riders feel the same."

AN EXCITING NEW EVENT FOR HOOK AND ODIHAM LIONS and A NEW SERVICE CONCEPT

The Village Connect Trail

Hook & Odiham Lions decided as part of their Village Connect programme, which was (established to bring three villages closer together) to run a sponsored walk with a difference. The key objectives were to raise money for local schools, encourage the community and schools to explore and appreciate the local countryside, support local pubs and cafés and hold a coming together event after the challenges of the last 18 months.

Odiham and Hook Rotary Club agreed to be partners in this initiative along with local schools. The Lions would set up the walk, including safety measures, and the route but would not be benefitting directly from the event. All nine local schools were invited to take part in the event so that they could get their staff, pupils and parents involved in the challenge. The walkers would get sponsorship and all moneys raised would go to their school. It was also publicised in the wider community so that anyone could take part and help the local schools or just enjoy the trail.

Keller Williams, Estate Agents in Hartley Wintney, undertook to cover promotional costs so that the costs to the Club were minimal.

On the weekend of 25 and 26 September more than 300 walkers took part in the 16 mile walk on public footpaths, but walkers could do as little or as much as they liked. They could even retrace their steps!

Final figures are not yet available but we know it will be in the thousands.

This was the first time we had run such an event but we plan to do it again next year. We chose to support schools as they have had such a difficult 18 months. We have learned some lessons but basically all the hard work has been done this year so we are ready to go with just some minor tweaks to be made. We are confident we achieved our four original objectives.

The Editor has the last word ...


