### Dear Family of Lions ...

### **MARKETING – PART 5** ABOUT EVENTS

So far in this mini-series we looked at marketing as a whole, public relations, advertising and promotions. So what's left in this particular marketing mix? Events – that's what's left.

Why choose events rather than the other bits of the marketing mix? Simple. People remember events. The people you want to relate to are much more likely to remember events and those organisations who staged them than what are often the fleeting images associated with the other elements of marketing.

Many years ago I was involved in the launch of a new publication in Jersey. Our key customers were Londonbased advertising agencies particularly those who managed big spending clients — airlines, motor manufacturers and, it must be said, the tobacco industry (whose advertising then was quite legal).

Rather than invite the agency space buyers to Jersey, we staged a launch event on a narrow boat cruising from London's Little Venice and served them all jellied eels and London Pride. Five years later, the buyers were still telling me about their cruise up the Grand Union Canal and were still advertising their clients' products in our publication.

As Lions we stage major events – the Jersey Lions Swimarathon (the 2022 one will be the 50<sup>th</sup>), the Guernsey Lions Donkey Derby, the Windsor Lions Great Horse Ride through Windsor Great Park and the Fleet Lions Beer Fest. There are other similar events throughout the District.

These events are memorable, they are all significant fundraisers and the people we wish to influence – those in the community who will put their hands in their pockets and wallets – respond generously year on year. They remember the events and, more particularly, provided we ourselves make it clear, they remember who organised them and we, and those we set out to serve, benefit accordingly.

To make events memorable, be innovative although there's no reason why other people's good ideas can't be copied (unless it's something done by the nearest Club!).

Above all make sure everyone knows who the organisers and beneficiaries are, use the other marketing tools to promote and advertise the events and afterwards the same devices to tell everyone how successful they are.

# Jersey Lions' 50-year project poised for a great leap forward



Since the mid-1960s, Trustees appointed by the Lions Club of Jersey have owned a 26-bedroom hotel for visitors with disabilities.

The hotel, Maison des Landes, and originally little more than a large cottage, was a legacy to the Club from founder Elizabeth Ashton Edwards who had started taking disabled guests in the 1950s.

Since 1967 the Trustees have steadily expanded, developed and equipped the hotel exclusively for the benefit of disabled visitors.

Due to Covid-19, the hotel was unable to open in 2020 and the Trustees took the decision to use that time, and subsequently all of 2021 and likely most of 2022, to carry out a £2.5 million refurbishment to create a state-of-the-art hotel with a Community Hub which will open the hotel's facilities (which include one of Jersey's only two hydrotherapy pools) to local residents throughout the year.

Thanks to the generosity of local supporters the

Trustees have raised the £2.5 million required to carry out the refurbishment which will commence in January.



# Stepping Stones

Warminster Lions Club have supported the Garden Project Appeal at the Stepping Stones Centre in Trowbridge with a donation of £2,000. President Lion Richard Owen said that this donation recognises the service provided to Warminster young people and families who attend or receive help from this facility.

Stepping Stones is an Opportunity Group for children in the West Wiltshire area aged up to five years with special needs. The Appeal aims to raise £40,000 to make the garden a safe and versatile outdoor learning environment for the children to enjoy and use all year round.



Lion Richard and Good Causes Team member Lion Nick Humpherson visited the Centre to present the cheque (pictured) and be given a tour of the garden and the work completed so far. Lion Richard wished the staff every success in achieving the required total in the very near future.
