The Bigger Picture

Global Service Team News - March 2022

World Earth Day falls on Friday 22 April. Once again I am asking you to consider undertaking a Litter Pick on that day or within a week of World Earth Day.

Why do it?

Unless we look after our own communities' environments, and encourage others in the wider world to do the same, we will have a much poorer place to live in. How to do it:

- Survey your community and choose areas which are well used and have an accumulation of litter. This will enable the public to observe what you are doing.
- Check to see if there is a group already picking litter in your chosen area. You will need to gain consent to litter pick on private land with the landowners or on public land, e.g. with the Council or Canal and River Trust.
- As a matter of Health and Safety, carry out a risk assessment in advance. See the link to the guide provided by Litter Action.
- Ask your local Council if they can supply Hi-Viz vests/tabards, litter pickers, gloves and bags. If they are unable to do so, ensure your volunteers come equipped. Consider having the Lions logo and Club name printed on the Hi-Viz vests/ tabards.
- Choose a date, confirm with the landowners and advertise your litter pick, inviting volunteers to come along to help. To avoid large groups gathering mark out areas where groups of six can gather and send them off in different directions or at different times.
- Approach a variety of groups, e.g. youth clubs, Scouts, Guides and schools to help. Ensure everyone wears a Hi-Viz vest/tabard.

- Consider the link-up with other Lions youth projects, such as the Young Leaders in Service.
- Report any fly tipping to land owners for removal.
- Gather all the waste bags in an area and arrange for a collection.
- Seek permission from those present and take a photograph. Prepare a press release for the local media and social media. Send a copy to your District Environment Officer and to LCI via your monthly activity report. Don't forget to include the amount of bags of rubbish you've collected.
- Normally it's a good idea to provide refreshments or find somewhere to sit and have a drink after the event. This helps to make the occasion more fun and allows you talk about what you've achieved and plan your next litter pick.

Lions matters of moment



I am sure that none of us are not aware of what is currently going on in Ukraine. Lions do not do politics; we are there to support those who suffer life's injustices and to walk alongside those who need our help. LCIF has a "Refugees and Displaced Persons" fund set up for donations. The link has been posted to LCIF's Facebook page.

LCIF has received inquiries from Lions in Romania and Poland about potential grant support for refugee relief. Staff are working with leadership in each country to develop project plans for LCIF to support Lions-led distribution of immediate needs. Care packages will include food, water, hygiene items and clothing. The target amount for these initial grants is \$15,000 per country for Romania & Poland. After these initial

grants, LCIF will continue to work with Lions in the adjacent and surrounding countries to evaluate needs, and the potential for Lions to help. Lions in Ukraine are understandably not able to participate in relief work at this time, but may be able to in the future, to address some needs of displaced people. Ukrainian Lions may also collaborate with Lions in adjacent countries in immediate needs relief activities.

LCIF and LCI marketing and communications teams are collaborating on a wide range of items to allow an efficient and consistent response to inquiries received from Lions related to the situation and messaging of this information outward via social media, websites, etc.

MARKETING – PART 8 WHERE THERE'S A WILL...

IF THERE'S a will, I want to be in it." This is just the sort of catchphrase that might have been coined by American comedian W.C. Fields but with the drastic curbing of their usual fundraising activities due to the impact of the pandemic, more and more charities have relied on gifts in wills to be able to maintain their services to their beneficiaries.

We all acknowledge that, for many, discussing legacies is a difficult topic since it is a reminder of our own mortality. Nevertheless, gifts in wills do make an extraordinary contribution to many charities and there have been instances where a gift from a legacy has enabled a charity to undertake a project or projects to benefit disadvantaged people in the community that it could not otherwise have contemplated.

Mostly gifts in wills stem from a recognition of the value a charity has been to the person preparing the will or benefits that have accrued to family or friends from charitable beneficence. While no charity would ever expect to take precedence over loved ones, at a time when charitable fundraising has become more difficult and, indeed, more competitive, the inclusion in a will of a gift to a charity will be a valuable source of revenue.

Achieving this once again relies on profile. There is every reason why bodies such as Lions Clubs should promote the good they can achieve in the community with gifts from legacies.

Each year my own Club produces a Yearbook detailing the Club's activities in the community. This is a very valuable promotional tool since this book is distributed to the great and the good and the movers and shakers in our community. This has proved its value on several occasions - once with a six figure sum!

The perception often persists that a gift in a will is only of value if it is substantial but no charity will ever turn away a gift because it is too small.

It took four years... Eastleigh Lions donate a minibus to One Community



After nearly four years of fundraising, Lion Devan Kandiah of Eastleigh Lions was able to hand over a gleaming minibus to One Community at an event hosted by Peter Green Furnishers in Chandler's Ford.

On 24 February the ribbon was cut by the Mayor of Eastleigh, Councillor Cynthia Garton, followed by the Eastleigh President Lion Mark Campbell who named the minibus "The Lions Bus" and Age Concern chairman Devan formally handing over the keys to Adrian Hughes, chairman of One Community (pictured on the front cover). Lions Devan said, "The generosity of Eastleigh residents, County Council grants and donations made the task to complete the mission a pleasure. As an Eastleigh Lion, I felt we could raise the £30,000 to buy the minibus and we did."



Back in early 2021 telephone boxes in Hartley Wintney High Street were for sale. It was suggested that the Club buy one and install a defibrillator in it. The Club readily agreed and the telephone box was bought for £1. After much preparation, the defibrillator is now installed as are two notice boards. The first currently has an invite to join us and the second will advertise our events.

While this was going on the Lucy Piggott Sports Centre was nearing completion. Lucy, a promising young athlete, aged 17, and a friend were both killed while out running by a car whose driver was over the limit. The Hartley Wintney Parish Council, together with local sporting clubs, are providing this facility on a new housing estate. The Club offered to provide a defibrillator on the building so that it could be used when the centre was closed.

Both sites have plaques highlighting who provided the defibrillators (pictured above)

Both are being handed over to the Council who will be responsible for their upkeep and maintenance.

These defibrillators are not the first provided by Hook and Odiham Lions. Some years ago one was provided for Hook in the village centre, followed by one in Odiham on the wall of the Co-Op (which leads to Goodchild Square) and, more recently, the Club paid for the installation of one in Tunworth. The latest two are part of the Village Connect Programme and the Club is looking to see where provision is poor so that the situation can be rectified by providing additional machines. Nearly 80 fishermen and many lions braved the cold and a lucky lan Peake (pictured with his catch and organiser Peter Oates) took home a fantastic prize of more than £400.

With a donation from the Ford branch of Unite and entry fees and raffle ticket sales, £1,000 was donated to the Rose Road Association who provide vital services for more than 300

children and young people with severe physical disabilities, learning difficulties and autism across the county of Hampshire.

Essential help delivered at great speed.

IN MEMORIAM

Lion Eric Nixon passed to higher service on Tuesday 4 January 2022, aged 93.

Eric was introduced to Fareham Lions in 1981, following a conversation with a neighbour.

In 1986 Flight Lieutenant Eric Nixon retired from active service from the RAF after joining up in 1944 at the age of 16 as an apprentice, an impressive 42 years' service.

He served the Club as Treasurer and President but was not content to sit still and served as an officer of District 105D and MD between 1997 and 2012 as either almoner, community service chairman or as speech, hearing and Medic Alert.

One of the projects Eric worked on as MD officer was resolving the issue of recycling and repairing hearing aids. He liaised with HM Prisons where prisoners learned the skills to repair hearing aids and put them back to use. Eric visited the prison to see the work being done. They even let Eric out!

In 2005 Eric was presented with the Melvyn Jones Fellowship and also received an International Medal from the International President in that year, Lion Jimmy Ross.

When Pat became District Governor in 2007, Eric provided a tremendous amount of support as well as his well-known and well honed chauffeuring skills.

Around 2009/10 Eric was diagnosed with early stages of dementia but continued his service informing clubs, schools and organisations about what it is like to live with dementia along with PDG Pat. This brought involvement with Kitbags and Berets, a group for ex-service personnel living with dementia.

In 2018, Eric celebrated his 90th birthday as a Citizen of Honour, bestowed by Fareham Borough Council for his service to the community.

Fareham held its Senior Citizens Afternoon Tea Party (delayed) in October 2021 and on this occasion, we asked the Mayor of Fareham, Cllr Pam Bryant, to present Eric with his chevron for 40 years' service as a Lion.

This was Eric - a Lion of industrious application, quality of service and true friendship. He will be remembered for his Legacy, Inspiration, Occasional Numerous Stories.

Funds will go to help WABC get more disabled people out on the river.
