Chichester Lions Spectacle Recycling

I was fortunate to visit Chichester Lions spectacle sorting room a short while ago and had an update from Lion Sue Boucher. She gave me some useful information about the collection of spectacles which I have collated for your use:

- Chichester have changed the focus from 're-use' to 'recycle';
- Used as seen good spectacles are sent to Medico France;
- Gold coloured ones are processed for metals, mainly gold
- Broken spectacles can be accepted;
- Sunglasses can be accepted;
- No cases or cleaning cloths to be sent;
- Prefer not to have loose lenses, but if you have any, please remove from packaging and put all lenses in one small bag in with the spectacles;
- No need to count how many Chichester Lions prefer to know how many boxes they will be receiving;;
- No spectacles are sent to landfill. Any not suitable after sorting go to a company in London to be processed into metal and plastic for re-use (a donation has been received by Chichester Lions).;

- Some spectacles are given to contacts to sell (the Far East market is particularly good);
- Designer spectacles are often sold and any moneys raised (once running costs are taken out) go towards sight-related initiatives/charities;Spectacles should be boxed up for delivery rather than sent in bags;
- No free parcel delivery service available;
- Before delivering check their webpage for updates and contact them that way – <u>www.chilions.org.uk</u>;
- Hearing aids (and batteries still in date) can be put in with spectacles but keep separate if possible, in an envelope or plastic bag if loose. Please leave in any original boxes if still available. These can be sent direct to Lion Michael Nolan – Hearing Project, if you have sufficient.

Lion Sue Boucher asks that all Clubs ensure their websites display the correct information about whether they collect spectacles and where their collection points are.

Alternatively, if any Lions are travelling to Birmingham spectacles can be dropped off at HQ as it now has sorting facilities.

Diabetes Awareness Day is celebrated on 14 November and diabetes is one of the Global Causes that Lions have agreed to focus on. As with most initiatives, LCIF can provide grants to help with funding for projects.

The LCIF Diabetes grant has an expansive reach. LCIF's diabetes focus will be placed on large-scale diabetes prevention, management, awareness, and service projects that have the potential to improve the public health of a community. More specifically, the Diabetes Programme will support projects that fall within one of the following intervention areas:

Large-scale fixed facility or mobile screening initiatives which target at-risk communities/ individuals when combined with comprehensive follow-up care by qualified professionals. Use of diabetes risk assessments and diabetes education is required.

Health facility expansion through renovation and equipment acquisition to improve existing infrastructure and increase patient access to existing diabetes services.

Initial or refresher training of qualified health personnel who work with people living with diabetes/ prediabetes, and/ or the training of Lions as community diabetes educators.

Funds are also available for public awareness initiatives and support groups if these activities are incorporated into one of the four intervention areas.

It is recognised that not all Lions ides will be able to be supported by this foundation programme. The good news is that LCIF and Lions Clubs International have funds available through other programmes. What these are is shown in the next column.

- SightFirst: Supports diabetic retinopathy projects set within a comprehensive eye care programme.
- **Community Impact Grants:** Helps clubs and districts support small scale community projects using a share of their donations to LCIF.
- As with all grants from the Foundation there are requirements that need to be fulfilled by those applying. Lions must raise local matching funding in the form of cash contributions equivalent to 25 per cent of the total project budget.
- At least 25 per cent of the required matching funds must be collected at the time the application is submitted to LCIF. This must be evidenced through a bank statement included in the grant application.
- Lions must have the balance of the local matching funding collected by the midpoint of the projected timeline. The project midpoint will be calculated from the date of approval. The exact deadline date to have all local matching funding collected will be specified in the grant agreement.

The applications for Diabetes Grants are due no later than 90 days prior to the start of the Board of Trustees meetings, which take place in January, May, and August.

More information about Grants can be accessed via the Grant Toolbox on our International website. This date in November is a wonderful chance for our clubs to let the public know what we do about Diabetes.

MARKETING – PART 14

MANAGING PERCEPTION - 3

In July we looked at the four basic conditions we looked at in July which were integral as to how successfully we manage perceptions where these might differ from reality. It's easy, at times like these, to lapse into marketing jargon which I'll try to avoid.

With the right message and managed in the right way, perceptions change. What you think you are and what others think you are can become the same.

When it comes to perceptions, you'll recall we face four basic conditions:

When those we are trying to influence have no perception of us and what we do, we must create one. This is fundamental. We must make those who are unaware of us, become aware of us. We use our brand (the Lions logo) and we promote ourselves by using all the media we have at our disposal. The media bridges the gap between ourselves and our community. We use the media to tell who we are and what we do.

If there is already a favourable perception, we can reinforce it by adding new elements. We do this to keep up to date. New elements are how we have developed, recent services, new members, new technology, and particularly if we are using social media, we do this on a regular basis.

If the perception is negative, you change it by knowing what causes the negativity and make every effort to change it. This is not easy since it means recognising flaws we might have and putting them right. The biggest flaw we are likely to have is poor communication!

If the negative perception is very deep-seated then often making a complete change in how the concept is promoted will be required. Hopefully, with Lions Clubs comprising very well-meaning volunteers, this is unlikely. Nevertheless, we must be honest with ourselves. And remember that at all times how we are perceived is in our own hands.

With the right messages and managed in the right way, perceptions will change. The benefits are significant – more successful fundraising, easier recruitment, more self-fulfilment and ultimately more enjoyment in being a Lion.

The Lions International Youth Camp and Exchange Program is back

After a long absence due to Covid restrictions, countries around the world are now finalising their plans to host their own International Youth Camp in the summer of 2023. The scheme is quite simply amazing but don't just take our word for it here is what one youth said about the trip in 2018:

"I chose Belgium as I had always wanted to see the country. I feel like I saw, and did, everything! We explored new cities, perfected the art of eating spaghetti, and even visited Luxembourg. But it was the people who truly made the trip exceptional. I had a brilliant host family, and once at the camp there were 37 of us from 24 different countries, as well as the amazing camp coordinators. I learnt about so many different cultures, and I now have friends on (almost) every continent. It was an unforgettable three weeks, definitely some of the best of my life. I would highly recommend partaking in the Lions Youth Exchange program to anyone who has the opportunity"

The Lions International Youth Camp and Exchange Program introduces thousands of young people to life in other cultures by helping them experience living with a host family in another country and then spending time at an international youth camp (whilst called camps most don't involve a tent or any camping). Each year usually over 100 camps are available to choose from 40 or more different countries around the globe. The scheme has been in operation since 1961. Clubs can participate in one of two ways; 1) by inviting applicants from their local communities to apply for a place at a camp of their choosing around the world next summer and; or 2) by offering to act as a short term host family for youths applying for a place at the camp in this country next year.

It's a wonderful way to help our youth expand their horizons and meet like minded people from different countries. Clubs hoping to send anyone abroad under this scheme should start engaging with their schools about this at the start of the new academic year in September. GLOBAL CAUSE – HUNGER World Hunger Day Sunday 16 October

Did you know that the Food and Agriculture Organisation estimates that we entered 2022 with **828 million hungry people.** This is an increase of around 150 million people since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic despite there being more than enough food produced in the world to feed everyone on the planet!

With climate changes many crops are suffering from too little or too much rain. In the UK farmers have raised concerns about expected yields from the crops this year. What's more, the average family throws away £60 worth of food and drink monthly. Many supermarkets in the UK are stopping 'best before' dates to help combat this.

Conflicts around the world impact on various food distributions from their countries, these also impact on what we consume. Globally many countries are looking at ways to reduce food wastage and how to grow different types of produce to feed the growing world population.

Over the coming months the admirable work that Lions Clubs already do with regard to helping the hungry will undoubtedly increase due to the ongoing situations in our country and abroad. Please think about what your Club can do to support the relief of hunger.

He was an eminently memorable personality and those few members of the Jersey Club who remember him from the days when we attended Conventions in some numbers were similarly saddened.

So the event has been cancelled for although the fields we use are served by bore holes, the prospect of the Lions Club promoting an event that relies on thousands of gallons of water to make the mud, while everyone else is suffering a hosepipe ban, would not have been good PR.
