THE HISTORY OF SPECTREK

SpecTrek first began in April 1982 and was styled as a 'Spectacle Safari'. Members of Petersfield Lions Club walked the 90 miles from Petersfield to Weymouth pushing two wheelbarrows of spectacles the whole way! Future years were less pedestrian as Club members drove vans instead.

In the early years the spectacles, collected from Lions Clubs throughout the south, including Clubs across the water (the Isle of Wight, Guernsey and Jersey), were taken to Weymouth Lions who moved them on to the Missionary Optical Society based in Cornwall. The Society then graded and packed them before dispatch to Africa and Asia.

Eventually Weymouth no longer had a place for the spectacles to be stored and so all the spectacles were taken to a storage site, made up of large shipping containers, found by Eastleigh Lions. The provider of the store then passed them on to the Society.

A few years later the owner of this store went out of business and very rapidly, somewhere had to be found to store, by then, 50,000 plus pairs of spectacles. Also, at the same time, the Missionary Optical Society were no longer in business!

Chichester Lions had been running a nationwide collection using Parcelforce for some time and they were contacted. Thankfully, they were able to help, although the spectacles other Clubs had collected added a lot to their steady annual flow. In the first year we took all our collection to various sites around Chichester.

Thereafter, the spectacles were passed on to Midhurst Lions where they were stored in the dairy on the Cowdray Estate.



Petersfield Lions Club continued with its annual SpecTrek run, sending vans on two routes in the old District of 105D – one to the north and the other to the south, for many years. The Club made many friends along the way. Due to rising costs of fuel, etc., there were fewer pick-up points but the Clubs always made us welcome.

Eventually we were no longer able to store the numerous boxes of spectacles in the dairy at Cowdray Park and Petersfield Lions Club felt it couldn't continue to co-ordinate the event, so our District then took on this initiative.

Having been involved for several years, including contacting the Clubs and sorting out the timetables for the routes, I have fond memories of the Sundays we travelled across District 105D collecting spectacles. I never made it to the northern route but rode shotgun on the southern route many times.

One year stands out when we had so many boxes of spectacles that I had to have boxes packed around me as there was no room left in the vehicles. Health and Safety hadn't been invented then!

Today it is heartening to see that many Clubs continue participating in SpecTrek, albeit in its new format and as a new district. Long may the Lions of 105SC continue this tradition which started 40 years ago.

Lions matters of moment



I wonder how many of you remember your Club supporting LCIF's pledge to raise funds to fight measles, alongside the Gates Foundation? If your Club or indeed you personally supported the appeal, then a big thank you. LCIF reached their goal and no longer have measles as a designated donation 'pot', instead the Empowering Service Fund for donations such as these is there instead. Please bear this in mind when making donations in the future.

One of our core areas remains that of helping to support projects that improve sight. Thursday 13 October is World Sight Day, an opportunity to put on an event to highlight the day or to hold a collection.

Pakistan – at present five grants of \$10,000 for emergency, or immediate need have been approved by LCIF and are being

used for food, clothing, blankets, medical provision, and the Lions are working with the voluntary organisations and the Pakistani Navy to see that the aid gets to where it needs to be. At present there has been no application received by LCIF for a \$50,000 major catastrophe grant. I am sure you will understand that this is a fluid situation and is changing all the time. Thank you if your Club has made a donation.

In the meantime, there is also plenty of information on the international website, so take some time to read about the work our Foundation does and see if it inspires you!

MARKETING - PART 15

Marketing for Beginners

Some experts consider marketing one of the dark arts. Others, more sensibly, regard it as a series of disciplines that create, promote and deliver products and services that enable objectives to be met through the value they generate.

We call these disciplines 'the marketing mix' and in this ongoing series of articles we shall look at each of the following elements:

BRAND PREDISPOSITION - How inclined people are towards the brand;

PAID MEDIA - external communications channels that have to be paid for;

OWNED MEDIA - Communications maechanisms owned by the organisation, e.g. websites , newsletters, etc;

EARNED MEDIA - comments about the brand from third parties, e.g. news stories, social media comments, etc;

USER EXPERIENCE - How people feel after 'using the product';

PATH TO PURCHASE IMPACT - what people experience in the run-up to 'using the product';

AVAILABILITY - how easy it is for people to find out about the brand;

LOGO/BRAND IMPACT - the ability of the logo to draw the eye and conjure positive feelings towards the brand; and

POINT OF 'SALE' EXPERIENCE - what people experience in the moments before contact or use.

Those already familiar with marketing will recognise the foregoing as the 'mix', whether the product is tangible goods or services such as those offered to their communities by Lions Clubs.

Who and what is a Lions Club has often been described as a very well kept secret. That's a secret we are all now about to share.

Next month, we'll start taking apart these elements of the 'marketing mix' and looking in detail at how we apply them.


PASSED TO HIGHER SERVICE

WAREHAM LIONS ROAR BACK AFTER COVID SHUT DOWN

Wareham Lions is a vibrant Club supporting the local community from money raised at events. At the core of the Club's activities is a minibus used to take older and less mobile residents to lunch clubs and other

As we will all remember well, normality came to a shuddering holt when the pandemic restrictions took effect. The Club signed up to the County volunteer register and helped with shopping for those unable to leave their homes. When the vaccination programme kicked in our minibus was used to provide transport to and from the local vaccination

centre. It was also called upon to transport the less able to hospital appointments at Poole and Bournemouth when clinics resumed. Obviously strict rules were maintained to prevent passing on the virus.

Thankfully we are now getting back to former activity levels although the momentum lost during the shut down has taken some time to be restored. Our minibus is now supporting the local disabled club transporting its members to and from events and socials and to take people to a lunch club on the quay. It has also been called upon to transport Ukrainian refugees to events at Lulworth and Bournemouth.

In July we supported the local carnival, marching in the parade and putting our stalls up on the showground. Weekly fun party events on the Quay have resumed for visitors on locals once a week. Skittles, a tombola, 'Higher and Lower' cards, 'Water or wine?' and a draw for soft Lions toys are our standard contribution to such events. These have proved popular, enabling us to raise several thousand



pounds which will be used to support the community and keep our minibus on the road. Wareham is an old Saxon town and this year a festival was put on to celebrate the town's history and illustrate how the Saxons lived and fought. It was a pleasure to take our stands to this event. The tireless support of our members and wives have ensured that our contribution to these events have been a success. Members have worked hard to give meaning to the Lions pledge 'We serve" for the community of Wareham.

The Lions went along to have a look. We decided, if we could purchase some sleepers, a raised bed could be made on the sloping back lawn. The soil removed, when levelling the greenhouse plot, could be used to fill the raised bed.

The Lions have dealings with the great team at the Men's Shed Club who agreed to help with the physical work, if Lions could get the materials sorted.

The Lions then approached Equestrian Fencing and Timber in Shedfield. When we explained what we needed and why, they supplied all the timber for free. (see below). Yet more kindness!

Men's Shed then did the grafting and what a result: a greenhouse constructed on level ground and a raised bed - the family were delighted and so were all the groups concerned. A great team effort!

Why report service?

Some Clubs ask why do we need to report service. This might get you thinking. The numbers served by our global causes in our District for 2021-2022:

Diabetes - 3,000; Environment - 29,723; Hunger - 10,574; Vision - 30,176; Paediatric Cancer - 10: Other causes - 185,680

The total of people served by us in our District was 259,136 (That's more than a quarter of a million people!!!)

Last year 55 per cent of Clubs reported service and 1,066 activities were logged so how much higher would those figures have been if more Clubs had reported.

Lions is the best kept secret – let's show the world what we do. How powerful would it be on our web-pages to let the public know how many people we serve?

Can we do better this year? So far only 36 per cent of Clubs are reporting so if you need any help please get in touch with me and I will find someone who can talk you through how to report service on MyLion.

The Editor has the last word ...


