MARKETING – PART 17

Looking at the Marketing Mix

In October's edition we identified the nine disciplines that make up 'the marketing mix'. In this article we examine three more of them.

EARNED MEDIA: Comments about the Lions' 'product' from third parties, e.g. news stories, social media comments, etc. Essentially these should be the results of our own public relations activities. Other people talking about us, particularly when it's in praise of what we do or have done, is among the most valuable 'product' endorsements we can achieve. We can stimulate such third party endorsement by asking, where it is appropriate, those, particularly other organisations such as charities, rather than individuals, who benefit from our community service if they would publicly say so.

USER EXPERIENCE: How people feel after 'using the product'. The Lions' 'products' are our services to the community and hopefully anyone will feel better from the experience of being helped and supported by Lions, whether that's by funding, providing manpower (a non-gender expression!) or counselling. The 'user experience' should always be positive and we should always seek to make it so.

PATH TO PURCHSE IMPACT: What people experience in the run-up to 'using the product'. This experience will be tempered by how easy we are to find, how we respond to enquiries and how we activate our responses by following up. This will also be conditioned by how people perceive us - is our profile higher when we are fundraising or when we are active in community service? In other words, are we perceived as an organisation that raises money so that it can help others, or an organisation that helps others but needs to raise money to do so. Perhaps surprisingly, there is a significant difference.

Next month, we'll be analysing the final three of the nine elements of the 'marketing mix' and looking in the same detail at how we apply them.

In the meantime, have a wonderful Christmas and a peaceful, fulfilling New Year.

PASSED TO HIGHER SERVICE

The Lions Club of Alton has reported with sadness the passing to higher service of Lion Nicholas Branch. To family, friends and his fellow Lions, 105SC Sentinel sends sincere condolences.



The competitions for this year are now under way.

We have a new competition this year - **THE DAVE EBSWORTH AWARD FOR ENVIRONMENTAL EFFORT.** This award is being presented by DG Dave to the Club or Zone that has achieved the greatest impact on maintaining or improving the Environment within 105SC.

It could be awarded for one particular action such as a Beach Clean, Litter Pick or Tree Planting or for a number of smaller actions during the year. These could be recycling projects such as collections of spectacles, foil packaging from tablets, bras, tins and glass or anything else that can be reused. It could also be awarded to a Club that works with another group to help the environment including working with your local Council on planting up flower beds. Taking part in the Environmental Photographic Competition will also count. In fact, anything to improve or maintain our Environment will be considered by the GST Committee and the DG team.

To enter all you have to do is record what you are doing on MyLion! I would ask that I can advertise any new activities so that other Clubs can take them on as well.

Also a fairly new Competition is open – **THE NIXON AWARD**. This award was given by Eric and Pat Nixon in recognition of all the work that Eric performed over the years for Community Service. This can be for the greatest variety of community service carried out by a Club from one Convention to another or for a special innovation in response to a particular situation e.g. the refugees arriving from Ukraine, food parcels or a specific piece of technical equipment needed for someone with special needs.

The award will be judged by the GST Committee in conjunction with the DG team.

The award was made, but never presented to Romsey Lions during lockdown. It was presented to Hook and Odiham Lions at Convention in 2022 for the variety of the work carried out including their Village Connect Trail.

Also being revived this year is the **BARRIE RICHARDSON TRAVELLING AWARD** which encourages Clubs to visit other Clubs, Zone Meetings, Conventions, helping other Clubs at fund raising activities or attending other Clubs' social events including Charters. Different points are given for the various categories and full details can be found on the 105SC website - <u>https://www.lions105sc.org.uk/</u> clubs/awards/barrierichardsontravellinglionaward.html

Currently there are 22 Clubs taking part and the leaders to date are Loddon Valley followed by Hook and Odiham and Eastleigh. Don't forget to send in your photos for the ENVIRONMENTAL PHOTOGRAPHIC COMPETITION by Friday 30 December.

Please also record all your Service Activities on MyLion as this will be a major part of the judging for some competitions.

MAISON DES LANDES ACCESSIBLE HOTEL & COMMUNITY HUB A major project of the Lions Club of

Jersey since the 1960s is nearing the completion of a £3.8 million refurbishment programme



In the 1960s the relatively newly formed Lions Club of Jersey was approached by a local resident who, in a somewhat remote part of the Island (they do exist!), was providing holidays for people with disabilities. Her property was a surprisingly small cottage, albeit with significant land attached.

The Jersey Lions took up the challenge and began very active fundraising. By 2020 the cottage had grown and become a hotel catering for up to 50 guests. Covid closed the Hotel that year and the Council of Trustees, the actual owners of the Hotel and appointed by the President of the Lions Club, embarked on a total refurbishment programme which began earlier this year with an eventual cost of circa £3.8 million.

To date the Trustees have raised £3.5 million (with, among others, generous help from the Jersey Lions Swimarathon) and are confident of achieving their total, so that the new hotel and community hub will be open for business in June 2023.
