The good news is that 6 per cent of Clubs reported service in December – up from 26 per cent in July.

However, that still means 39 per cent of Clubs are not reporting.

Only two other Districts have a higher percentage of reporting than our District so a big thank you to all the Clubs who do report their service activities.

What can you report?

- Holding meetings to strengthen your Club, educate and train members, or plan other service activities;
- Fulfilling administrative tasks, such as running errands, maintaining Club records or reporting;
- Attending Lions events such as Conventions and Forums; and
- Engaging in fellowship, and fun, together with other Lions.

What can't you report?

When Lions serve their communities individually, outside of the activities planned by their Clubs, Districts or Multiple Districts

Lions helping people to help other people

Lions Den continues to be a startlingly successful way of unearthing and aiding many diverse, charitable groups and organisations in the local community.

This year Reading Lions were able to help thirteen groups who are committed to helping others, but don't have grant funding or the manpower to carry out



significant fundraising. The Lions are always amazed at the richness of generosity and the gifts of valuable time given by these applicants to improve the lives of other people.

For the Lions it is also a learning experience, as they often learn about the myriad of small charities in their midst of whom they had previously been unaware.

Among them this year were a group which helps autistic adults by creating a safe social network for them, also, a small charity providing 'care bags' for people undergoing breast cancer treatment and another was a Parish Youth Group, set up to combat knife crime and to provide safe places for young people in the wake of Olly Stephens' tragic murder.

Reading Lions have been organising these annual events since 2017, awarding more than £52,000 to 85 local groups. This year an Awards Ceremony was held at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Reading, without celebrities or champagne, but a room full of happy kind people! One quote from a person receiving their award was: "We are overwhelmed with joy and satisfaction". So were the Lions!

The Club awarded a total of £8,139 towards local projects which will improve the lives of many. Giving the money was easy – it's the people who applied for these grants who are going to do all the hard work! So, it's a case of people helping people to help people. Perfect! This is the way forward in the current poverty crisis.

Your Club Secretary has been sent details to register delegates and alternates with the District Secretary.

Accommodation at the Convention hotel is booked separately, and the window for the excellent Convention rates is closing: bed and breakfast £75 per night for a twin/double, or single. To book at this rate, **call the hotel** on **0333 320 9345 option I**, quoting "Lions23".

Parking at the hotel is limited. Those who are staying at the hotel can park there, first come first served, at a cost of £5 for 24 hours. You will need to log your registration details with the hotel. If you cannot get into the car park the hotel will issue residents 24 hour permits for local street parking, also at a cost of £5 for 24 hours. Day visitors will need to find local parking – there are abundant spaces at the Seafront carpark on Clarence Esplanade, for example. For those with electric vehicles, see the attached link for details of where you can access charging points – there are none at the hotel. **Electric charge points - Portsmouth City Council**

WALK FOR DIABETES!

We are challenging you to organize a Walk for Diabetes to raise awareness of the disease, raise funds for diabetic projects, raise awareness of LCIF and raise some funds for our charity.

We are suggesting June for the walk as 12 to18 June is national Diabetes Week. LCIF Europe Day is also 12 June, so holding a walk could fulfil both objectives.

Final plans have yet to be worked out but we see this as a Zone event. While the Zone Chairmen will be involved in some co-ordination, it is envisaged that a Club or Clubs in the Zone will take the lead and organize a walk. We suggest five miles as a maximum but this could be laps of shorter lengths and we would encourage the walk to be off road to avoid problems with traffic.

LOOKING AFTER YOUR ENVIRONMENT

Does your Club carry out Litter Picks?

They are a simple way of helping to improve your Environment. I would urge you to think about doing one to mark World Earth Day which is on **22 April**. Please see tips below:

How to Get Involved and Organise a Litter or Plastic Pick

Global Cause: Environment

50 Word Synopsis of Project:

Unless we look after our own communities' environments, and encourage others in the wider world to do the same, we will have a much poorer place to live in. A Litter or Plastic Pick is an excellent way to celebrate World Earth Day which is on 22 April each year and is a way to encourage more volunteers to get involved.

How to Guide:

- 1. Survey your community and choose an area which is well used and has an accumulation of litter. This will enable the public to observe what you are doing.
- Check to see if there is a group already picking litter in your chosen area. You will need to gain consent to litter pick on private land with the landowners or public land, e.g., with the Council or Canal and River Trust.
- 3. As a matter of Health and Safety, carry out a risk assessment in advance.
- 4. Ask your local Council if they can supply the following: hi-viz vests/tabards, litter pickers, gloves and bags. If they are unable to do so, ensure your volunteers come equipped. Consider having the Lions logo and Club name printed on the hi-viz vests/ tabards.
- 5. Choose a date, confirm with the landowners and advertise your litter pick, inviting volunteers to come along to help.
- 6. Approach a variety of groups, e.g., youth clubs, Scouts, Guides and schools to help. Ensure everyone wears a hi-viz vest/tabard.
- 7 . Consider the link-up with other Lions youth projects, such as the Young Leaders in Service.
- 8. Report any fly tipping to the land owners for removal.
- 9. Gather all the waste bags in an area and arrange for a collection.
- 10. Seek permission from those present and take a photograph. Prepare a press release for the local media and social media. Send a copy to your District Environment Officer and to LCI via your monthly activity report. Don't forget to include the amount of bags of rubbish you've collected.
- 11. After the event provide refreshments or find somewhere to sit and have a drink. This will help to make the occasion more fun and allow you talk about what you've achieved and plan your next litter pick.
