# **Lions matters of moment**



### Lions Clubs International FOUNDATION

As we are all aware in February 2022 Russian forces invaded Ukraine. The response from Lions to the Refugee & Displaced Persons Fund was, and still is, amazing. Thank you if your Club has donated to our charity, Lions Clubs International Foundation. Your donation may have been used as part of two grants awarded to Lions in Estonia. Since the invasion nearly 118,000 Ukrainian refugees have fled to Estonia, 24 per cent are children who are now attending school. More than 20 Clubs in north and south Estonia arranged events to help the children assimilate into their new communities. The Clubs arranged transport and sponsors and at the end of the events the children received a Lions goody bag with essentials for school.

Or perhaps your money was part of a grant that went to Lions in Finland who received nearly 50,000 refugees who had fled with nearly nothing. The Lions used the LCIF grant to supply the refugees with the essentials they needed which they hadn't been able to bring with them.

For those who remained in Ukraine Lions have helped more than 7,500 Ukrainians in Kyiv, Balt, Bahmach, Zaporizia, Odessa, Mariupol, Kharkiv, Podolosk and central Ukraine with food packages and medicines, saving the lives of two children in Mariupol. These are some of the examples of where our donations have been put to good use. If you want to know more go to: lionsclubs.org/UkraineResponse

We only have a month of figures left to come for this Lions year.

I am so grateful that 105SC has donated \$96,764.65 so far. Every year we are set a goal and ours was \$38,382.36, so we have achieved that and some by 366.77 per cent.

Our donation figures put us third in the District's donations table and our goal percentage means we are second.

A BIG THANK YOU if you or your Club has donated. But we mustn't rest on our laurels as our charity needs our support to be able to be there when called upon to help those who really need to know that when they are at rock bottom, somebody in the world is there to help and that someone is a Lion.

## **CREATIVE THINKING**

At the recent Convention, as well as being asked for examples of successful creative thinking I was also asked about instances where creative thinking went wrong. Such examples are difficult to find because those involved rarely talk about them. However I am reminded of what is probably one of the most spectacular failures.

There was a time when cigarettes were widely advertised on televison and, with the huge budgets the tobacco companies had available, some truly stunning advertising resulted. Since most 'Virginia' tobacco tasted the same, branding was what made the difference whether I (now a non-smoker for more than 40 years) chose to be seen smoking cigarette Brand A rather than Brand B. The brand I smoked identified me.

Breaking into the market (this was when smoking was still a very popular pastime) was difficult and launching a new brand always brought forward the advertising industry's best talents. So it was with Strand, a new brand from one of the major British manufacturers.

Picture the scene during the commercial break on your television - the Thames Embankment at dusk and it's raining. You hear a distinctive tune played on a harmonica as a single figure wearing a stylish trench coat and trilby hat walks towards you. He pauses, takes a packet of cigarettes from his pocket and lights up, his chiselled features shown briefly in the flare of his lighter. As he inhales and the music wails, we see the caption and hear the voiceover say: "You're never alone with a Strand".

The ad was acclaimed as was the tune "The Lonely Man" but the brand was a failure since the brand message was clear - if you smoked Strand, you were lonely. Probably because you had BO? No-one wanted to be branded like that. Sales were minimal and the brand withdrawn.

Great creativity. Lousy result.
