GETTING THE WORD OUT

Last month we talked about getting the word out - sharing this 'best kept secret' by talking about it to family, friends, workmates and associates.

The value of word of mouth is often overlooked. People hold opinions which they usually want to share, particularly if what they want to share is beneficial to themselves or their friends.

Let's get people talking about us.

But how do we do that?

As Lions we have activities which, as can been seen from our magazine and the nnewsletters from other Districts, make a significant impact on our communities, almost always for their betterment. In very simple terms our role is to make things better for our communities.

We do that in two ways - we hold fundraising events to be able to afford our community welfare services and we organise community events which will be of direct benefit (e.g. prostate cancer testing). Both will raise the Lions profile, provided that it is quite clear as to who the findraising and community service organisation is.

It has been my experience that very successful fundraisers such as Jersey's Swimarathon are so well known (and since its inception in 1972 has raised almost £4 million) that even we occasionally forget to make sure that every reference to it is that it is the LIONS Swimarathon. Although we have an excellent sponsor, we still ensure (with their full agreement) that the Lions identity is paramount

There are events (including at least one Lions event I am aware of) that has its sponsor's name to it rather than the Lions. It is successful but the credit tends to go to the sponsor rather than the charity. We'll explore this particular element of getting the word out next month.

The bigger picture



Here we are at the start of another Lions year, maybe this will be the one when your Club decides to take on that community project. A grant from the Foundation may be able to help your Club, Make Your Mark in your local community. Look for Grant Toolkit on the International website or get in touch for further help and advice if you think the Foundation can help your club

Just as the Foundation is there to help Clubs with local projects, the Foundation comes into its own whenever disaster strikes. Local Lions use grants from the Foundation to help those in need when they are at their lowest. Sadly, the need for such aid does not decrease and this forthcoming Lions year will be no different

For the Foundation to be able to award grants, we need to continue to donate to the Foundation, after all, it is our Lions charity.

If your Club didn't donate last year, this may be the year to encourage it to do so. Donations go towards 'credits' which can then be used to purchase Melvin Jones Awards.

As of 5 June, 105SC donations for the year were \$48,858.82, that is down on the same period the previous year. Remember when a grant is awarded for any project, the funds are overseen by Lions on the ground who are accountable to the Foundation.

Those of you who were at 105SC Convention in March may remember in my presentation I mentioned community centres being built by Lions. We, as Lions are still working in those areas where the earthquake struck, and we will remain while there is a need for us to do so.

Deacon, our own Dementia Officer, is of the same opinion. Know that Denise is there for all of us, and that Pat is happy to talk to you from her perspective.

The Editor has the last word ...


A happy new Lions year to the Lions of 105SC and may the next twelve months achieve all you have in mind.
