

## GETTING THE WORD OUT - 3

I was asked recently how any organisation measures the effect of its marketing and PR wih any accuracy.

It's a good question and one which has no easy answer. Lever Brothers founder, the late Lord Leverhulme, once claimed that he was well aware that half of the moneys his organisation spent on marketing was wasted but he didn't know which half.

Now if that great lord of commerce doesn't know that answer, who are we to suggest that we might. We'll see.

I was addressing a group of disabled visitors to Jersey recently and was telling tham that the hotel they were staying at had been funded, since the mid-1960s, largely by the Lions Club of Jersey. At the look of mystification adopted by some of my audience, I asked them if they were aware (they mostly came from the Midlands ond north of England) of Lions Clubs where they came from. They all were (something of a relief!) but when probed as to what the Lions they were aware of did drew answers as diverse as "aren't they like Rotary Club" to "isn't it a lot of men growling like kings of the jungle?" Evidently the Lions Clubs in their areas have a low profile whereas Rotary doesn't. I explained briefly what Lions Clubs do and several vowed that when they got home they would seek out their local Clubs and get to know them.

I had hoped that since my audience was made up entirely of people with disabilities and their carers, their local Lions Clubs might have been seeking them out. Nevertheless I was pleased with that result, albeit it was the ciustomer seeking the salesman rather than the other way round. More about how we find out how true Lord Leverhulme's comment is for us, next time.

### **Melvin Jones Fellowship**

The award is made by a Club to an individual who has gone that extra mile in their service to Lions Clubs International. It is the highest award a Club can be bestow and is named in honour of our Founder. The recipient does not necessarily have to be a Lion. It can be someone who has supported Lions activities, a Club, or contributed outstanding service to their community.

When a Club donates to the Foundation, all the money goes to where it is supposed to, but a bit like a store loyalty scheme, a Club earns 'credits', measured in US dollars and is referred to as status of instalments. Each award costs \$1,000.

It is always advisable to check with me to see if your Club has enough 'credits' for an award application.

Clubs can make the application themselves on the the form on the Lions International website or via the connection on the new Portal. However, I suggest that I am sent a copy since I can complete the application on behalf of the Club.

If anyone has any questions regarding MJF or the Foundation, then please do get in touch.

If your Club is hoping to give a MJF award, then please apply in plenty of time.

A new Lions year also means new International President LCIF supporter pins, and also Club patches.

Please continue to support our Foundation.



It was great news that the MHRA approved Lecanemab for some people with early stage Alzheimer's. However, NICE disappointingly did not approve its use by the NHS.

The Alzheimer's Society is calling on Government and health systems across the UK to prioritise dementia by improving early diagnosis.

Now on to the report for our District's fundraising for Dementia and a round- up from some of our Clubs: Yateley & District Lions Club - I am currently Club secretary and we are saving up our Tail Twister fines to be donated at the end of the year. Some of our Lions, Ursula, Karen, Ian and others, regularly volunteer at the Daisy Chain Café, Yateley, a friendly place for people with dementia or memory loss and their partners/carers with an array of activities and entertainment throughout the year. Our Club is funding a day out for all of them and the volunteers in October (jointly with Neighbourcare) to Milestones Museum in Basingstoke.

Hart Lions Club held a PoshTea Fundraiser and donated £1,390 to Dementia UK. This was an outstanding result – well done, Hart!

Newport Lions Club made contact with their local Dementia Ward asking staff what they needed, and provided funds so they could put together activity buckets for their patients. Just recently the Club purchased cushions for an outside space where patients can sit with staff or families. So far, £300 has been donated. Maybe this is something other Clubs could try? Well done, Newport, on this excellent idea!

A reminder to all Clubs: DG Sandra has reminded Clubs to share anything they are doing with regards to dementia with me. If this can include totals of amounts raised for Dementia UK too, I am collating this information to provide an end of year figure.


