International Women's Month

March was International Women's Month, an opportunity to celebrate the incredible impact of women in Lions leading globally and serving locally. The month honoured their contributions and commitment to uplifting women in our Clubs and communities.

MARKETING AND BACK TO BASICS

Last month we observed that within marketing there are several tools that we could be using to promote who we are and what we do, i.e. advertising, promotion, PR, product knowledge and personal contact. We also said that we would be looking at those activities we can achieve without spending our own precious resources.

The role of advertising is to inform, persuade and remind. The advertisement allows you to say what you like (within the limits of truth, taste and the laws of libel), when you like and where you like. However advertisements carry a cost because the media rarely carry them for nothing (even for charities) and your freedom to say what you like, etc. generally requires design even for social media. Such designers don't come cheap. Some charities do have advertising budgets but these tend to be those that can also rely on very significant financial support. That sort of support is not usually associated with Lions Clubs.

A way of overcoming this drawback is to get someone else to pay your advertising costs, i.e. by sponsorship. My Club has a major fundraising event which is widely advertised on all the local mainstream media as well as online and the cost is met by the event's sponsor who obviously shares in the publicity generated. Nevertheless the balance must be right (the event remains the Lions whatever and not Bloggs & Co's whatever with the Lions as junior partner). I am aware of one instance where a charity was so dazzled by the financial value of the sponsorship, they were prepared to 'sell' their event to the sponsor, drastically limiting its appeal to the public. They have regretted their decision ever since.

The bigger picture

Some of you may remember September 2024 when Hurricane Helene ripped through parts of the south-eastern United States. At least 233 people lost their lives and more than four million were left with no power. For millions, the storm changed everything. Everything is lost, personal items such as family photos, wedding photos and treasured family items.

Realising that the road ahead for the victims would be long and difficult, LCIF approved 11 grants totalling \$335,000 in response to Hurricane Helene. This amount included nine emergency grants of \$15,000 across Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina and Tennessee. These grants helped to provide water, food, cleaning supplies, torches and linens. Added to this MD35 (Florida) and MD31 (North Carolina) received Major Catas-trophe Grants (MCAT) of \$100,000 providing more assistance.

Two weeks later when Hurricane Milton struck Florida, District 35-0 received a further grant of \$15,000 to help provide eating utensils, bedding, toiletries, cleaning supplies and non-perishable food to those who had been affected.

District Governor Strong says: "We never would have been able to provide the community with the service we have without LCIF.

So please continue to support the Foundation. It allows Lions to serve their communities and let them know that someone, somewhere cares.

During the day more than 500 men gave blood samples to a team of phlebotomists in what was described by several attendees as a very slick and efficient operation.

Although the Club has hosted several annual testing sessions in the past, this was by far the biggest one to date. The Club was advised by one of the PCaSO volunteers that this session was one of the largest in Hampshire.

It was a great example of teamwork with Lions, PCaSO volunteers and NHS phlebotomists working throughout the day to deal with the constant flow of men booked in for a test.

So efficient was the processing that the three rows of chairs laid out in the waiting area was rarely needed, as most men were taken straight in to have their blood sample taken before they had the chance to sit down.

The Club would like to say a massive 'thank you' to the Bowling Club for allowing the use oif the hall for testing. Thanks also to Places Leisure and Fleming Court Business Centre for being able to use their parking facilities and, of course, the Lions, PCaSO volunteers and NHS phlebotomists who gave up their Saturday to make the event such a success.



WE NEED MORE DUCKS!

Eastleigh and Swanwick Lions Clubs need to replace a raft of racing ducks which took an unplanned detour during last

year's race and were not able to be recovered.

The size of the all-yellow contestants is125mm high (base to top of head), 130mm long (chest to tip of tail), 105mm wide (across fattest part of body), 60mm high (body only) and 75 gms weight.

The Clubs are looking for 100 ducks, but only if they meet the above criteria as they will need to be able to mix unobtrusively with the existing 2000+ flock and hopefully exhibit the same performance characteristics (float upright and don't push and shove to gain unfair advantage during the 1 km race).

SWINDON LIONS SUPPORT THE PROSPECT HOSPICE

During the weekends leading up to Christmas last year, Swindon Lions, helped by Father Christmas, held their usual collections outside four Swindon supermarkets, Sainsbury's (Bridgemead), Waitrose and Morrisons (Eldene and Haydon Wick). At the time, it was stated that at least 50 per cent of the collection would be given to the Prospect Hospice as all members were acutely aware of the value of this institution to the town and the surrounding areas and there was widespread appreciation of the funding crisis affecting it.

In the event, the collection raised just over £2500 and the Club agreed to make a donation of £1500 to the hospice. The rest of the collection will be added to Club funds to enable help for the disadvantaged in the borough. Very many thanks are due to the numerous shoppers who paused and put donations in the Lions' buckets or touched cards on card readers.

The "big cheque" was duly presented by Club President Lion Pete Kennewell, Vice-President Lion John Farmery and Lions Anne Robathon and Steve Austin to a group of the excellent nurses and support staff of the Prospect Hospice.

President Lion Pete said that this donation would not have been possible without the generosity of Swindonians who have shown their support to the Club and the Prospect Hospice.



A busy year so far for the Yateley & District Lions.

The Club secured a Winter Cost of Living Grant for its Hunger & Environment Project and have been busy helping those in the local community.

So far hygiene packs and breakfast cereals have been donated for those in temporary accommodation with the Hope Hub, food supplies to the Hart Food Bank, helped a disabled person have her garden restored to a manageable level. The Lions are in the process of providing Dementia Activity packs to the local hospital for their in-patients, food and hygiene supplies for the local food pantry, and networking with local charities and organisations with plans for the coming months. The Club is continuing the regular community bingo fundraiser running for more than 20 years.

There is already a series of community events already lined up where the Lions have been asked to support other charities and organisations, so members and volunteers will have a busy year ahead.

Visitors to the Club so far this year have been the Zone Chairman and the Hart DC Community Project Officer.

Brain tumours kill more children and adults under the age of 40 than any other cancer, yet just one per cent of the national spend on cancer research has been allocated to this devastating disease since records began in 2002.

The Jersey Lions' 2025 Swimarathon raises £80,000 (with more to come)

At the end of five days' swimming, this year's Jersey Lions Swimarathon has raised more than £80,000 with 392 teams completing 23,215 laps of the Island's Les Quennevais pool. This sum does not include the very generous sponsorship of local finance house Ravenscroft (for the seventh year) ensuring that, by meeting all the event's setting up costs, every penny raised by the swimmers goes to the Lions' nominated beneficiaries and other good causes supported by the Club.

The Swimarathon, the Island's biggest sporting fundraiser and one of the longest running, has raised almost £4 million since the first event – the Jersey Lions Sponsored Swim - in 1972.

The theme of this year's event was "Support for those living with cancer" and the charities chosen were ABC Breast Cancer Support Jersey, CLIC Sargent Jersey, Friends of Jersey Oncology, Jersey Brain Tumour Charity, Jersey Cancer Relief, Macmillan Cancer Support and Jersey Hospice.

"Once again, after so many years, it's still amazing to see so many swimmers of all ages taking part and clearly enjoying the event," says Lion Chris Palmer, organising committee chairman. "The exertions of the swimmers make the event what it is and the generosity of our sponsors Ravenscroft covering all the administration costs means that every penny raised by the teams of swimmers goes to charity. Furthermore, the success of

the event and its very existence relies on the support of many volunteers, suppliers and the help and expertise of the management and staff of Les Quennevais pool."

As in previous years, donations and sponsorships are likely to be received for some time, which including the event's sponsorship, is likely to push the gross income beyond $\pounds 100,000$.

RECYCLING IN THE GARDEN

Now Spring is here, many of us will be busy in our gardens.

- You can help save the environment and save money by recycling various household items such as reusing plastic pots and trays. After cleaning these can be used several times.
- Food containers, with holes in the bottom, such as those used for soft fruits, can be recycled into containers for starting small quantities of seeds or for growing on plug plants. Other plastic food containers, without holes, can be used as gravel trays.
- Choose wooden plant labels instead of plastic or make your own.
- Use jute netting which is biodegradable.
- Use old tights as tree ties. They don't cut into the young bark of trees.
- Clean and then reuse plant labels.
- Use loo roll holders as starting planters for seeds especially those which have long roots such as broad beans and sweet peas. They can be planted into the ground and will disintegrate quickly.
- Use soft drinks bottles as mini cloches. Just saw off the bottoms.
- Use plastic milk bottles as mini watering cans.
- Collect the cold water from hot taps as the water warms up. The milk bottles are very useful for this.
- Old tyres can be used to make containers.
- Reuse the compost from grow bags as a mulch on borders.
- Use broken terracotta pots laid on their sides as unusual planters for sempervivums.
- Put bits of broken terracotta pots into new pots to help drainage. Make your own compost if possible – it saves land fill and transport
- Collect seeds to resow or buy locally to save air miles.
- Try growing your own fruit and veg to save air miles.

These are just a few ideas. Do you have more? If so please let me know.



YOUNG PEOPLE WITH DIABETES

Around 1,500 children are living with Type 2 diabetes. It's still rare and most children with diabetes have Type 1 which cannot be prevented and isn't linked to lifestyle. Speaking to a number of young people with Type 1 diabetes, they have often inherited the disease from their parents and it can run in families. A young lady I spoke to said she was absolutely terrified about getting diabetes after being told by her doctor that she was on the borderline to becoming diabetic. Diabetes was rife in her family and she was very concerned with regard to what to do about it.

There is a need at grass roots level to get young people involved in learning about diabetes.

Diabetes might be rare in most children because they are so active. What happens when children are less active? How soon after leaving school or fulltime education do young people start to get diabetes? My initial aim is to get one school and one youth group involved in this project.
