

Mission 1.5 is the drive to reach 1.5 million members worldwide, so we can better meet the growing needs of our communities where ever they are and serve more people than ever before.

MARKETING and the brand

- We've talked a lot about the 'brand' in this column but I was asked recently what I actually meant by constantly referring to the brand.
- The verb 'to brand' originally meant 'to mark with a flame' and was widely used as a punishment. A very painful one and it is still used in that way today although usually with words rather than a branding iron, e.g. to brand as unreliable.
- In the 15th century the term came to mean 'distinctive marking' when farmers began using hot irons to burn markings on to their property to prove ownership.
- Over the centuries branding has assumed different roles. It can mean proof of ownership, or to enable accountability, or to build familiarity, and to guarantee authenticity, e.g. a hallmark is a brand by another name.
- Another role is to inform admirers. What does that mean you might well ask? For centuries artisans have put identifying symbols on their work so that potential customers admiring their products would know where to take their custom. Designer brands do the same today. Think of Lacoste's crocodile and Ralph Lauren's polo player. I wear Lacoste glasses and I am well aware (since in Jersey opticians charge for their services) that I have paid a premium to have that little crocodile on the side frames on what otherwise could be considered as run-of-the-mill spectacles. Why did I do that? My wife has given up asking. Nothwithstanding, above all the most important

aspect of the brand is the building of familiarity, the stimulus that caused me to buy Lacoste glasses rather than Boots. That's why it's very important that on whatever we do we carry our brand - the logo of Lions Clubs International.



This year's programme is well under way with 80 schools registered across the UK, but in 1055C we are slightly behind the curve, we know many Clubs are engaged with schools, and we have a few ideas for you to progress your conversations.

If you have not looked at the programme before, it really is a brilliant inspirational education competition run in partnership between Lions Clubs British Isles and 8billionideas. The unique programme inspires children between the ages of seven and 11 to think big, dream big and change the world with their amazing ideas.

ROAR 2024 saw 146 schools take part in this programme, sponsored by 76 clubs and engaging with some 30,000 children!! Since its inception in 2016, more than 125,000 children have taken part in ROAR, and we have had 1000s of teachers and parents involved too. <u>Why would schools be interested?</u>

Lions and teachers love the programme just as much as the children do, we have the road fully mapped, it really is easy for your Club to engage with and support a school, just contact the District Leads Lions **Eric Warner** or **Graham Drayton** for more information.

What do the children do?

The children have great fun; learning about the big ideas that can change the world, they think about what needs to change, they come up with the big idea, they create a model of the idea, they create a marketing poster and jingle too. What should you do next?

Agree as a Club to sponsor a school, £185 well worth spending in your local school.

Engage with your local primary schools, a quick search on the web will let you have the details of local schools, reach out to them and share the information available on our website at <u>https://www.lions-roar.com/</u>

If you need to write to the school, we have templated emails ready for you, just ask and we will send them over. Talk to one of the ROAR Team to register your interest in the programme.

Once you have agreement from the school and funding agreed then you register the school on the 8billionideas system at <u>https://8billionideas.typeform.com/ROAR2025Reg</u>

Once registered and paid for, the school will be sent links to the programme collateral. It is all online, and easy for the teachers to work with.

Then keep in touch with the school, get out to the school for the programme launch, get involved with the school winners selection and help them send in their winners video entry. Yes, the school winners create a video entry of their work and this is what will be judged.

We wish you the best of luck, you have till the end this term to get schools registered and if need be you could register schools as an exception, at the beginning of the autumn term.

Saturday 10 May saw the Ringwood and Fordingbridge Lions Club supporting the New Forest for Ukraine's Aid Hub. Also bringing donations from Ringwood residents who wanted to contribute to supporting Ukraine but could not attend, the Lions then packed and prepared aid for transport. They had collected and brought vital items which are in short supply in Ukraine including pasta and other long life foods, toiletries, hygiene and sanitary products.

The team then worked alongside NFFU volunteers to pack all this ready for transport, received donations and saw in other donors as they arrived and helped to pack and prepare everything ready for despatch.

Lions Club President Alastair Ward said: "This is our third visit as a group to New Forest for Ukraine and it is great to see and be involved in so much good that is being done from so close to us in the New Forest. We love getting involved and doing what we can to make someone else's life better."

Lions Club Membership Officer and Past President Lion Steve Sherring said: "We do a lot of fundraising and we support local and wider communities with humanitarian and community projects. But it's always great to be able to get involved and see the results where donations brought by us and others are packed and ready to go to the people who need them".

John Allison, Head of New Forest for Ukraine said: "Huge thanks to the Ringwood and Fordingbridge Lions Club and everyone who has contributed to the donations. On behalf of the Ukrainian people we support, many of whom are displaced and vulnerable, this means a lot."

RAISINO AWARENESS OF DEMENTIA

District Dementia Awareness Officer Lion Denise Deacon reports.

Many thanks to those Clubs reporting what they have been doing to raise awareness and support for those living with dementia, including fundraising. From those I chatted to at the District Convention, most Clubs appear actively to be doing this.

Personally I have been submitting reports to District, participating in meetings, providing articles for Sentinel (albeit with a few gaps owing to illness). I have been raising awareness and signposting on social media and attending various local events. I have been preparing posters, visual auds and handouts including official publications. I have been networking with other voluntary organisations in my local area and attend collaborative meetings which have been helpful.

I have been a Dementia Friend since 2012, raising awareness and am passionate about the condition, having cared for my mother with Lewys Body Dementia in the six years prior to her passing (and experienced many complications on the way which I learned from) as well as supporting other family members and friends with various forms of dementia and having been an HCA in nursing homes and in hospital.

I am an official fundraiser for Dementia UK, a registered supporter for the Alzheimer's Society and participate in research, usually via surveys. I have just completed the NCFE CACHE Level 2 Certificate in the Principles of Dementia Care to keep myself up to date.

HOW CLUBS ARE Supporting Dementia

Yateley Lions donated £250 activity packs for dementia patients in Frimley Park Hospital; donated to enable those living with dementia and their carers with volunteers from the Daisy Chain Café to enjoy a day out. Club members regularly volunteer weekly at the Café. The Club donated the proceeds from the Tail Twister of around £50 to Dementia UK. I was invited to attend an organisation to give a dementia awareness talk and provide signposting, and an opportunity also to deliver some MIABs as well as the Club's support literature shared with senior citizens and those with mental health conditions providing local contact information for advice.

Petersfield Lions donated the proceeds of £16 from their Tail Twister to Dementia UK.

Lion Rodney Davis of **Swindon Lions** gave presentations to two dementia/elderly clubs, delivering some MIABs.

Hook and Odiham Lions supported local dementia clubs with Christmas party donations and paid £100 for First Aid courses for a dementia club in Rotherwick.

Fleet Lions have been fubdraising, paid for canal boat trips and are funding a premises for a local dementia Group.

Newport Isle of Wight provided activity packs and outdoor seating for a local hospital.

ENVIRONMENTAL UPDATE

Welcome to the new Lions Year and this month's environment mailing. A few ideas for this month.

ORGANISE A BEACH CLEAN - OR YOUR LOCAL WATERWAY

We are overrun by waste - it is infiltrating our ecosystem, polluting soil, sand and sea. Through weather and run-off, everything ends up touching the ocean in some way. Currently, there is a 1.6 million square kilometre garbage patch floating in the Pacific Ocean and future predictions tell a staggering story about the effect on wildlife by 2050, virtually every seabird on the planet will be eating plastic.

LITTER PICK Why do it?

Unless we look after our own community's environment, and encourage others in the wider world to do the same, we will have a much poorer place to live in.

How to do one: Survey your community and choose areas which are well used and has an accumulation of litter.

Sponsor a Repair Café

From the popular TV series – is there a Repair Café in your area?

Before binning a ripped t-shirt or faulty hairdryer, consider repairing instead. Approximately 92 million tonnes of textiles and more than 50 million tonnes of electronic waste end up in landfills every year. Not only that, but the production of new items produces further carbon emissions and drains natural resources - manufacturing a single pair of denim jeans produces roughly 30kg of CO2!

One of the ways we can mitigate these effects is to move away from a linear economy, where goods are produced, used and discarded, to a circular economy, where goods and materials are continuously kept in use, with waste and pollution significantly reduced.

The Repair Café was founded with this ethos in mind. Through pop-up events, you can offer a space to meet with skilled volunteers, to fix or refurbish broken or worn-out goods. Whether it's an electrical item that needs a new plug, a coat that needs a new zip, or a teddy that needs a new eye; your team will be able to offer guidance, advice or practical help to give the item a new lease of life.

This is a call for volunteers who can repair clothing, textiles and soft toys, small household appliances and electronics, and small household items such as furniture and picture frames. You could also consider repairing computing and audio equipment, jewellery, books, pottery or porcelain.

The café should be free to attend, with donations being welcome.

Learning a new skill and developing a mending mindset underpins the principles of the project.

Can your Club set one up in your area? It could be fortnightly or monthly or
